OBITUARY ADELBERT BISHOP

Mr Adelbert Bishop died May 28th at his home New Minas as announced previously. He had been ill several years and was seventy-four years of age. The funeral service was held on Sunday following conducted by Rev A.W. West and was largely attended burial at the Oaks Cemetery. Mr Bishop was born and resided his life time at New Minas. He was twice married his first wife being Sophia Bishop, three children survived by that marriage Dr. Bradford Bishop, Freeport. Mrs. C. F. Morrill of Peabody Mass. Mrs. E. Roy of Kentville. His second wife was Anettie Potter of Canning who survives. The children by the last marriage are Henry and Hugh at home, and Elijah at the front.

Mr Bishop was a prosperous farmer and always took an interest in public matters and the welfare of the country. He was a member of the third Horton Baptist Church.

Mrs Lavinia Avery

Notwithstanding the fact that Mrs Avery had not been in her usual good health ever since Christmas, it came as a shock to her numerous friends to learn of her very sudden death. She had evidently been reading a passage from a small volume "Holy Thoughts for the Day" May 30 and was sitting in her Arm Chair waiting for some provisions for the house, when "God took her."

Mrs Avery was a very loveable personality, sincere Christian woman, a devout Churchwoman, a friend to the needy, and by her calm, quiet religious life, a great influence to those who came in contact with her. The words of Solomon do well apply to her. She stretched out her hand to the poor yea, she reached forth her hands to the needy. She opened her mouth with wisdom, and in her tongue is the law of kindness.

Mrs. Avery was the widow of the late Rev. Richard Avery M. A. for many years Rector of Aylesford who on retirement made his home in Kentville. She leaves to mourn her loss besides numerous friends in the parish of Kentville, nephews and nieces in the United States.

A short service was held at her late residence on Canaan Avenue on Saturday morning, June 1st and was conducted by Rev. T. C. Mellor late Rector of Kentville, who was specially asked to attend to perform the rites by papers found by her Executor, the Hon. H. H. Wickwire and the Rev. A. M. Bent M. A. Rector of the parish.

The body was conveyed by train to St. Mary's Church, Auburn, where the beautiful Service of the church of England to be used at the burial of the dead was taken. The officiating ministers were Revs T. C. Mellor, A. M. Bent and A. R. Yeoman. The interment took place in the adjoining churchyard by the side of her late husband.
