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LONDON'S MILK SUPPLY.

About 160,000 Gallons Delivered in the City Every Day by an Army of Over 2,000 Milkmen.

None save those directly interested in the trade have the remotest idea of the vast quantity of milk consumed in London in the course of a year, said the manager of a well-known firm recently. Within the last "ten years the annual consumption of milk in London alone has increased by 18,-000,000 gallons, and now stands at approximately 160,000 gallons a day. Until 1865 London was responsible for its own milk supply, but the great

cattle plague of that year made it necessary for metropolitan dealers to send to the outlying counties for their milk, thus opening up a market for dairy farmers within 150 miles of London, which has been increasing by leaps and bounds. At present more than 30,000 hands find permanent employment in providing London. with milk, while over 2,000 milkmen go their rounds morning and evening delivering in pints, quarts or gallons, as the case may be.

The milk for London's breakfast is milked the evening before and churned ready for the night mail. It begins to arrive at 2 a.m., and a steady supply is kept up until 10 or 11, although the majority of dealers have been supplied by 4 a.m. At midday the merning milkings come in, and a gradual stream of churns is poured into London up till 8 o'clock, all of which have to be duly emptied, cleansed, and sent back by the late trains. To prove that this is no light task it may be said that a large firm will have 5,000 churns in use divided into three portions. Each churn therefore reaches them once in three days, costs 25 shillings, and has an average life of from two to four years, according to the length of

the journey. The metropolis is not entirely pendent upon the country for its eases of the delicate womanly organs milk, however. There are about 15,-000 cows in London which produce between them 7,500 gallons of milk a day, but the capacities of the dairy farmer in or near the city are somewhat curtailed. Furthermore, the authorities are very strict as cleanliness, and will only grant licenses for cowsheds, which are perfectly drained, roomy and well ven-

London is the best in the world as 300 public inspectors to analyze it, while all the large firms employ private inspectors to see that the supplies are delivered by their milkmen ntampered with. Every churn after being used is cleaned by steam being driven into it with the force of 60 pounds to the square inch, which cleanses the receptacle more thoroughly than anything else could co. Without becoming too statistical, it is interesting to note that a canal 6 feet 6 inches wide, 4 feet deep and half a mile long would be necessary to hold all the milk that comes into London every day, and, as a gallon

procession thirty-four miles long.

Grace Darling, whose death took place on Oct. 20, 1842, is still remembered as the heroine of the Fame Islands, whose bravery helped to save nine nives in a terrible storm off the coast of Northumberland. The Fame Islands, which are little more than barren and desolate rocks were so dangerous to navigation that a lighthouse was stationed upon Longstone, one of them, and there William Darling, his wife and daughter Grace, n almost absolute seclusion But a day came that caused their name, and especially the name of Grace Darling, to be honored in every part of the British Isles. In the morning of this particular day a boat in distress was seen about a mile away, but the storm beat so fiercely that the boatman at Bamborough, near at hand, refused to push off, and Darling, used to such scenes as he was, shrank from the danger. But Grace's heroism asserted itself, and soon she persuaded her father to let her take one oar while he took the other. They reached the wreck and returned safely to the lighthouse with nine survivors. The news of this heroic act soon spread, and in time tourists from many countries visited the Longstone lighthouse and paid their respects to Grace Darling. Not only were Grace and her father entertained by the Duke and Duchess of Northumberland and presented by them with a gold watch, but Grace was awarded the silver medal of the Shipwreck Institution, and received as well a purse of £700 from public subscription. Not even after all these attentions did she lose her somewhat reserved disposition and modest manner. She has been described as having a fair complexion and comely countenance, with a mild and benevolent character. Notwithstanding many flattering offers to leave the island, Grace Darling remained with her parents until her death, which took place four years later at the age
