The following is the text of Bloemfontein, dated Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock, says: "We surprised and outflanked the enemy with irresisti-ble force over night. Gen. "Bloemfontein, Tuesday, March 13. The British flag now flies over the presidency, evacuated last evening by Mr. Steyn, late president of the Orange Free State. "The enemy have withdrawn from the neighborhood and all seems quiet The inhabitants of Bloemfontein gave the troops a cordial welcome."

The above despatch, though dated Tuesday, was not received at the War Office until 7.30 p. m., Wednesday. It was made public a few minutes before 9 o'clock. The delay is attributed to the field telegraphs not being connected with Bloemfontein on Tuesday evening. 
