At Sandringham King Edward is At Sandringham King Edward is a country gentieman, and his guests encounter nothing more elaborate in the way of ceremonial than is to be found in many a far less distinguished dwelling. But at Windsor His Malesty appears in the full-dress role of King and Emperor, surrounded by all the pomp and pageantry proper to such an exalted position. Consequently those who are summoned to Windsor in the course of a year see infinitely more of the splendour of Sovereign state than do' the com-Sovereign state than do the com-paratively but, highly-favored few who are honored with invitations to

who are honored with invitations te Sandringham.

If the person "commanded" to Windsor lives, in London he will leave Paddington about 5.30 p.m., and find a royal carriage awaiting him at the other end of the journey. On arriving at the Castle he is re-ceived at the visitors' entrance by a page of the chamber, who conducts him to the apartments prepared for him. These are always specious, well warmed, well lighted and eminently comfortably comfortably.

Here, too, in another shrine of crystal and gold, is the Koran, found in the Madhi's tent after the avenging battle of Omdurman. It was in a very ragged and dilapidated con-dition when Kitchener presented it to Queen Victoria, but the wizards of the British Museum worked wonders upon it in the way of restora-tion. Dotted along the whole length of the gallery are cabinets of ex-quisite china, including a small col-lection of Rose du Barri that would set all the connoisseurs competing if ever it came into the market. Christie's would be likely to consider the auction poor indeed which failed to get a £25,000 bid for it. Portraits of Canning, Pitt, Beaconsfield, and many other eminent statesmen hang on the walls, and among the larger canvases is a fine painting of Queen Victoria's first council. set all the connoisseurs competing if ever it came into the market.

Punctually at 8.30 the King and Queen enter the corridor from their Queen enter the corridor from their private apartments, say a few words of greeting, and lead the way to the state dining-room, where hangs the late Queen's portrait by Constant, for which King Edward gave £4,000. The dining-room is already peopled with a vast array of servants. There are as many footmen in state livery as there are diners, and quite a lit-tle army of pages, cellarmen and as there are diners, and quite a lit-tle army of pages, cellarmen and clerks of the kitchen. The latter carve at a side table, and fear them-selves with quite imposing dignity while pursuing this very common-place occupation. On ordinary oc-casions they wear plain black dress, with knee breeches, but when a state banquet is being given in honor of a foreign ruler, or to celebrate some foreign ruler, or to celebrate some special event, they appear in very rich uniforms

During this half-hour Their Majesties make a point of conversing for a few minutes with each visitor. The rest of the evening is spent in the drawing-rooms, where there is plenty of good music and card-playing—no-tably bridge, of which both the King and Queen are very fond. In Queen Victoria's time the "dine

and sleep" guest saw nothing more of his Sovereign after, but other monarchs other manners, and the least distinguished visitor to Windleast distinguished visitor to Windsor can now count upon a few minutes with the King or Queen before leaving the Castle next morning. As a rule he is taken to the King's private sitting-room for this little valedictory interview, and if he has a drop of Irish blood in his veins he can scarcely fail to thrill with patrictic pride while there, for the furniture and decorations of the apertuiture and niture and decorations of the apart-ments are carried out in the true emerald green of the Emerald Isle.

King Edward has reduced the art of smoking to its simplest terms. He usually smokes cigars of the choicest Cuban brand, and he generally makes use of four a day. The cigars used by the King are of a rather short, full-barrelled kind, of medium strength. They are usually smoked only about three-parts through. Occasionally, when in the billiard-room, the King prefers a pipe, and a pipe is usually used over the morning's correspondence.

Latterly, however, both pipes and cigars are much less in use than formerly. His Majesty's favorite method of using tobacco is in the form of cigarettes. He formerly affected a peculiar brand of Virginia tobacco, but since the Egyptian cigarette was first introduced to his notice by the Duke of Clarence, His Majesty has abandoned the purer American weed for the subtler aroma of the Latakia produced in the factories of Cairo.

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
