How a Fish Sees.

The medium in which fresh-water fish live gives them a chance to see a great distance only in the horizontal direction, and the proper adjustment of the eye would make, under usual conditions, the optical axis take this direction. To me it seems impossible to explain the constant revolution of the eye-ball on any other hypothesis except that given, viz: That the optical axis extends forward instead of sideways.

When a fish wishes to eat anything, either at the bottom of the pond or at the surface of the water, it swims directly toward the object; and in this case the eyes are instantly adjusted in line with the body, so as to bring the image of the particle desired upon the posterior portion of the retina. In this case they lose their usual horizontal position.

If a fish wishes to turn to the right or left in the water, says Professor Aggar in the *American Angler*, the first movement is that of the eyes in unison in the direction of the turning. This would be entirely unnecessary if the apparent axis was the axis of most distinct vision as one of the eyes would see all that was to be seen on the side of the turning. After this movement of the eyes the body turns around to bring the eyes into their normal position, and there is again a movement of the eyes and next a movement of the body. This causes a peculiar jerking motion of the eyeballs during the whole time of the turning of the body.

Mother's Place in Temperance Work.

The thought of mother has redeemed many a wayward man who no other influence could save. A good mother is God's best gift to home. Where, then, is her place in the great battle of home against intemperance? It ought to be in the very front ranks of home's best defenders. By word and example she ought to teach the children to love and practice the holy virtue of temperance; she ought to be the first to practice what she teaches; to banish from her home everything that tends to encourage intemperance; to keep liquor from her table and out of her home; to teach the children that liquor is not necessary for joy, nor is it necessary for sorrow; that the home is brighter and happier when temperance rules; that the safest and best way to guard against all possible intemperance is total abstinence. Keep your boys sober, keep your girls sober. If intemperance enters, be kind to your counsel, be firm in your urging. Pray for the weak ones, pray for the erring ones. Your prayers and tears will often win a heart steeled against your unkind and harsh abuse. Mothers of Christian homes, enter the army of apostles of temperance! You can succeed where the printed word and the eloquent address will fail. You can reach the heart which refuses the influence of society and the church. Be apostles. Preach in your homes, preach total abstinence by word and example, and in your family prayers beg heaven to send its sweet influence into your homes, to the heart of your loved ones.

What is His Business.

Frances Willard, probably the best known and most highly respected woman in the United States, uses these strong words regarding the business and results of the saloon-keeper. Are the world stronger than the facts every day warrant? We think not. "I do not deliberately desire to do harm," says the saloon-keeper, "but I must keep my patronage recruited; because if I do this I am sure to become a rich man after a while. That is the reason why I am in the business. I must lay my tax on somebody's cradle, on somebody's dearest and best. In order to succeed I must take away the little fellow from his mother's side, but for him with cigarettes and cider, music, cards and young company, drawing him away gradually, until after a while I will change that boy's ideas so greatly that he who loved the songs of home and sanctuary shall far better leave the bacchanalian duty of the saloon; he who used to breathe God's name in prayer shall hiss out that name in curses; and I will so change his face that his mother would not know him and his soul that God would not recognize it."

Friends, it is because these things are true that womanhood has been aroused at last; for to protect her children is the dearest and most sacred instinct of a woman's heart.

The moral and physical destruction of mankind by the drink habit is no longer open to debate.
