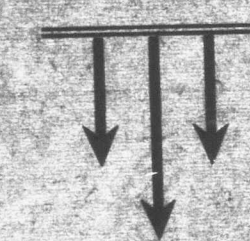

While in Hartland the other day the Victoria Observer man visited the establishment of Estey & Curtis Co., Ltd., and was rather surprised to see a business of such magnitude in this line in a country village. The business was established in 1896 and S. S. Miller has been the manager since the start. He has succeeded admirably. The firm bears the name of two local physicians, who originally held large interests in it, but since incorporation practically all the stock is controlled by Mr. Miller. This gentleman was very courteous in showing the editor around, for he



is a firm believer in advertising and knew that The Observer reached the people he wanted to sell to.

While the company started business in rather cramped quarters, they three years ago acquired a well-located brick block of three stories and basement, making four spacious floors. Adjoining is another large building devoted to their use and owned by them.

The street floor is the retail and dispensing departments. This comprises the finest drug store we have ever seen in a village the size of Hartland and compares favorably with the stores in large cities. Large plate glass windows front on two streets. The retail department has ample room for displaying goods and this is done with good taste and a strong appeal to customers. All the lines of goods usually carried in a drug store are here, as well as stationery, books, magazines, newspapers, cameras, fountain pens and many other special lines. F. A. Aiton, who has been with the firm during all the years, commencing work as a schoolboy, is chief of this department. He is a graduate of the Ontario College of Pharmacy, is a Bachelor of Pharmacy from Toronto University, and a member of the N. B. Pharmaceutical Society. He also holds diplomas from the Ontario Optical College and remedies defects of vision so far as glasses can do it with such skill that it is the boast of the company that they "have not one dissatisfied customer."

The dispensing department is lighted from the street by a large plate glass window and is one of the best appointed laboratories in the province.

Estey & Curtis Co., however, consider the retail and dispensing business as comparatively a side line. Their wholesale business is a tremendously greater turnover. In a wholesale way they handle all kinds of drugs and druggists sundries, all the lines they retail, G. B. chocolates and confectionery, wrapping papers and stationery, cigars and tobacco and certain lines of grocers' specialties, including cream of tartar, spices, etc.

ALLEGED MURDER AT FLORENCEVILLE

The story of the death of Fred Green of Fielding, coming out last week, is of shocking nature, and Charles Smith and Stephen Derrah of Greenfield are in jail charged with the murder of the man.

It is presumed Green was killed and thrown over the Florenceville bridge, or was thrown over alive, or in a drunken row fell over and was drowned. The body was found at Sugar Island several weeks ago and was unidentified up to last week, when Aaron Green recognized the remains as those of his son, Fred.

The Gleaner gives the following interview with the elder Green:

Aaron Green was almost a complete nervous wreck when he returned to Fredricton, yesterday afternoon after visiting the little country burying ground at Douglas, known as the Hawkins cemetery, where the remains were exhumed and identified.

"There is not a shadow of doubt that it is my eldest son, Fred. I intend to have somebody pay the penalty for his death for the information which I have secured the past few days shows that he must have been murdered."

Mr. Green gave The Gleaner all the details of the story in connection with the young man's disappearance. Fielding, where the family lives, is about three miles back of Bristol, in the northeastern end of Carleton county, and Fred Green left there about May 7 or 8, to go to Bristol to work for a few days. The following evening he went from Bristol down to Florenceville, ostensibly to attend a moving picture show, and some time that night met his tragic fate, as the next morning portions of his clothing were picked up in a pool of blood on the bridge across the St. John river there.

Nothing was known by Mr. Green, or other members of the young man's family of the finding of Fred's clothing until a few days ago, although the owner of the articles was pretty generally known about Florenceville. It is said. At first Mr. Green and his wife thought their son had gone away to work in the woods or on some drive for a short time and that he would turn up all right, as usual; but when a month passed and nothing was heard from the boy, his relatives became apprehensive and Mr. Green started an investigation as best he could.

He went to Florenceville, but some-how or other nobody there would talk with him very much about the case until finally he came in contact with a 9 year old girl, the daughter of Mrs. George Kenney, who lives at the end of the Florenceville bridge. The girl gave him the information he desired. She told him that on the morning following the evening that Fred Green was in Florenceville a blue coat and a tan shoe had been found in a pool of blood on the Florenceville bridge by William Hopkins, a driver employed by B. Frank Smith, M. L. A., in connection with his hay presses. Mr. Green went to the Hopkins home and there identified the coat and shoe as those worn by his son when he left his home.

That showed Mr. Green that his son had evidently been the victim of foul play and this was corroborated when Mrs. Kenney told him that she heard Charlie Smith, of Greenfield, who had been with Steve Derrah, of Gordonsville, and young Green earlier in the evening, declare late on the night in question that he (Smith) would kill Green if he could find him alive before morning. The bereaved father's theory is that Smith killed Fred Green on the Florenceville bridge and threw his body into the river, and he claims that from other sources he has corroborated Mrs. Kenney's statement to the effect that his son spent part of the evening in question with Smith and Derrah.

A sharp eye tooth on the left upper jaw, a white button which his mother had sewn on his un-
