RACE TIGHTENING UP IN THE NATIONAL LEAGUE.

With the pennant race in the National practically simmered down to a three-cornered fight between Philadelphia, Brooklyn and Boston, Brooklyn yesterday put a full-game crimp in the Phillies' aspirations by defeating the Quaker City team by a score of 7 to 1. The chief factor of the Phillies' defeat was the work of our old friend "Slim" Douglas, who pitched for Spokane no later than last year and who held Paddy Moran's men to one lonesome single for the first seven innings in which he worked.

While the Dodgers were handing the gaff to Philadelphia, the Braves were holding their own at the expense of New York.

From now on until the end of the season the Eastern clubs have very much the worst of the schedule, but it would be little short of a miracle even with the home games all in their favor, if any Western club pulled up far enough to give any cause for worry to the three leaders. There is always the outside chance, however, and with a no greater difference than two full games between the first seven clubs the race will be exciting until the ownership of the pennant is finally decided.

Brooklyn fares worst of all the leaders in the matter of home games having but three contests, including today's double header with Boston scheduled for Superb Park for the rest of the season. The other is with Philadelphia on September 23. Philadelphia has five home games, two of them with Brooklyn, but will furnish opposition to Boston at the new Brave's field in four of the present champion's eight remaining games.

\$3,000 BONUS GOES TO GILHOOLEY'S MOTHER

Toledo, Sept. 2.—Frank Gilhooley, who was sold last week to the New York Yankees by the Buffalo club of the International League, received \$3,000 as his share for the transaction. Gilhooley sent this sum to his mother here. He said in a letter to her that the Yankees paid \$8,000 for his services. Gilhooley had offers from the Pittsburgh Federals and the Brookfeds. He formerly was with the Yankees.

ITALIAN FORCES ARE STEADILY ADVANCING.

Geneva, Sept. 2.—Telegraphing from the front today, the correspondent of the Tribune stated: "The Italians have driven back the Austrians from Pizze to Savoreck. They also have advanced from Marina, capturing 700 men. Our forces also are making rapid progress in the Sugana valley, having taken 200 prisoners."

FOOL WITH GUN KILLED FRIEND

Vancouver, Sept. 2.—C. G. Shawcross is held under detention by the provincial police in connection with his accidental shooting of his friend and fellow-hunter, Wilfred Butcher on Monday morning at Nelson Island, about 100 miles up the coast from Vancouver.

The men who were employed at Nixon's quarry on Hardy Island went looking for deer. Shawcross, armed with an automatic rifle of a type prohibited by the game laws, saw the bushes move and pumped three shots so rapidly in one spot that all three passed through Butcher's heart and killed him instantly. Shawcross was obliged to leave the body in the woods overnight and on going home found that his own wife with Mrs. Butcher had gone to Vancouver on a holiday trip and it was here last evening that the woman first learned of her husband's death.

Shawcross brought the body to the city late last evening. Chief Smith of the provincial police ordered that he be detained pending the result of the inquest to be held this afternoon. It is possible that a charge of manslaughter may be laid. The deceased man was only thirty years of age. Besides his wife he leaves seven children.

NOT LIKELY TO CAUSE A CRISIS

Washington, Sept. 2.—Advices from Berlin stating that the German submarine responsible for the sinking of the Arabic neither was lost nor captured by the British caused great surprise in official circles here today.

If the reports are confirmed, it is expected that the Arabic and Lusitania questions will be pushed to an immediate head. It is believed, however, that Germany will attempt to justify the sinking of the Arabic on the grounds of "military expediency."

The sinking of the Hesperian is not believed likely to cause a crisis. Even though the reports of the drowning of Manley Wolf, of New Jersey are confirmed, this will not change the fact that the Hesperian was armed. It also is pointed out that the officials here do not consider it has been determined definitely whether the Hesperian was torpedoed or struck by a mine.

R. C. R. IS IN CAMP NOW AT SHORNOLIFFE

London, Sept. 2.—The Royal Canadian Regiment, 1,086 men of all ranks, is in camp now at Shorncliffe after having made the voyage across the Atlantic in perfect weather. This regiment consists of Canadians drawn from coast to coast. Col. Carpenter, in command, comes from Hamilton; Major Kaye from St. John; Capt. Dudaime from Quebec; Capt. Law from Toronto; Capt. McCulloch from Toronto, and Capt. H. Alloway from Quebec. The junior officers were drawn from these and other towns just as far apart.

ALLIES RAID HAD TERRIBLE RESULTS

London, Sept. 2.—In a despatch from Amsterdam the Exchange Telegraph's correspondent says: "According to reports from the German frontier the allies raids over Saarbrücken, Prussia, had terrible results. A military station was blown up and 75 persons were killed most of them soldiers."

CEDED TO BULGARIA

London, Sept. 2.—Premier Radoslavoff, of Bulgaria, stated in an interview with the Sofia correspondent of the Post that an agreement for the cession of the Dedegatch railway to Bulgaria by Turkey has been concluded and that the occupation of the ceded territory will begin 10 days hence in the presence of Bulgarian and Turkish officials.

TEUTON AND HUN RAVAGED BY CHOLERA

Rome, Sept. 2.—The reason why the Austro-Germans despite their success in the Eastern theatre of war are putting out feelers for peace is unchanged by the impossibility of further hiding the truth, now officially acknowledged, that cholera and typhus are raging in the central Empires. Every effort is made to hide the prevalence of an epidemic especially in Germany where the mortality is truly alarming. Measures adopted to combat the cholera proved insufficient as isolation is impossible and contamination is spreading.

CONFERRED WITH PRESIDENT

Washington, Sept. 7.—Secretary Lansing and secretary McAdoo conferred this afternoon with President Wilson over the Hesperian and Dumba cases. Secretary Lansing wanted to discuss the Dumba incident with the President before Ambassador Dumba reached Washington.
