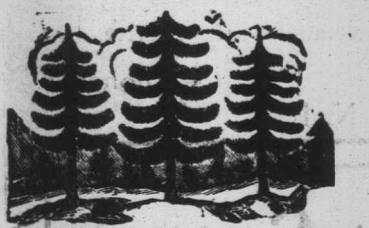

ANNUAL REPORTS

of Committees Submitted to Town Council Last Week

PLUMBING INSPECTOR. To His Worship the Mayor and Town Council of Campbellton Gentlemen:

A retrospective review of the past year, with new conditions arising as the town has increased in importance and activity, has brought many problems which will require your consideration.

The foundation laid five or six years ago for sanitary improvement show results which the community is justified in being proud of. Conditions, changing as they are from year to year, all point to the necessity of a code, and with Council sanction to enforce "when necessary."

While the Provincial Board of Health has formulated certain rules covering the average cases met in daily practice, a great many occasions arise where the Board is silent, or has no jurisdiction. In our opinion, there should be regulations in the form of By-Laws, ordinances giving authority for action. The system outlined has given perfect satisfaction in other places. We have reached a stage where it would be most desirable for us to be in possession of some such means of procedure.

The threatened water famine of the last few months shows the urgent necessity of just such regulation, not losing sight of the fact that our winters are severe in the extreme, and that even the best of our homes are very often caught with frozen plumbing. If we must allow a certain amount of waste, we would advise some regulation of the same.

Before the installation of our sewer system, when over ninety per cent of the plumbing then existing consisted of fat-traps usually located near a kitchen stove, and averaging fifteen feet of pipe exposed, no provision for waste was made other than a pail to catch drippings from tap, waste of water was then unknown, on the other hand, the most elementary rules of sanitation were sadly neglected.

Gradual though the changes appear, and all in the short space of five years, the aggregate of the results amply justified in a measure

The large quantity of new services installed within the last few years reaches an aggregate of some 650 connections to Water Main, no account being taken of addition to services already installed, such as closets, baths, lavatories and the host of accessories which but a few years ago were luxuries, but have now become absolute necessities to the modern home. The aggregate of those fittings has now reached the 1520 mark, and shows very forcibly that the most rigid economy will have to be practised

in the use of water, or we have reached the point when we have to decide on one of the two alternatives, that of either installing water meters to every consumer, or increase the size of our present water main, either of which would entail considerable expenditure.

The present supply, though quite ample for all legitimate use, will not allow the wanton waste witnessed here lately.

Our sewer system is now connected to 362 buildings. Although quite a few houses still remain unsewered, it is most gratifying to note that as soon as the undertaking can be financed the public as a whole is anxious to comply. While the results are most encouraging, it would be idle to think we have

reached perfection. We trust the Board of Health will in future show the same untiring energy and zeal which has characterized it in the past.

The sanitary system has caused little trouble, outside of a few private cases of ill usage. We might say the system as a whole is perfectly self-cleansing. Auxiliary to the appliances for periodical flushings, the whole system has been flushed twice, once early in summer and in November last.

A large quantity of our wood water service boxes had to be renewed on account of decay, and also where new sidewalks were laid.

All new boxes substituted are at present of uniform design, and practically indestructible.

All our hydrants are now provided with good drainage. While heavy expenditure had to be made to provide drainage, the risk of frost just at the time would be most needed amply justified the expense.

In the litigation between R. L. Duncan vs. Town of Campbellton re reservoir site, the case was settled by Arbitration in the early part of last summer. While the proceedings appear quite expensive, the public vote taken on Sept. 12, 1905, gave no selection but the course which has been followed.

Independent of the services installed, the following extensions were made:

253 in water and sewer on Gerrard Lane,

60 ft 6 in Sewer on Dalhousie St.

not only the increased consumption of water, but where practical a certain amount of leeway in the use of it.

As a typical instance let us select at random a cottage of say seven or eight rooms for five inmates a few years ago, one tap in kitchen was all that was required. With the advent of your Sanitary System, that one tap is now multiplied by seven distributed as follows: two in lavatories, two in bath tub, one in closet and two in kitchen, all of which are left running in winter time to prevent freezing.

While we fear, Your Worship and Gentlemen, we are taking much of your valuable time in detail which might appear out of place in a yearly report, our object is to emphasize the pressing need of a remedy.

Fully realizing that water is a prime necessity to all conditions of life, and also of the intricate and far reaching results that too great a curtailment might bring upon the sanitary and industrial condition of town, we must not also lose sight of the fact that the present supply is limited.

The quantity of new connections to our water system last year was forty-eight, for very nearly the average of the last five years. The above does not take into consideration additions to plumbing already existing, such as closets, baths and other plumbing fittings.

A few houses have had their plumbing altered to meet conditions outlined by the Board of Health. We feel it would be injustice to the present Board to pass without mention the results of their labor towards the sanitary improvement of the town, for although the Water & Sewer Department can supply means of improvements where required, it can only do so, when in harmony, and in co-operation with the local Board.
