SOME BY-LAWS PASSED.
Woodstock ratemakers declared in favor of the purchase of the electric light plant, by a vote of 457 to 105, and also in favor of an all-night system of electric lighting, by a vote of 748 to 127.

EMBRIDGE. decided to purchase the electric light plant by over 200 majority.

OTTAWA. favors a reduction in the number of aldermen, by 3,269 to 2,349. The by-law for municipal control of electric franchises, etc., was carried by 3,359 to 2,602.

HARRISTON. voted to enable the town to take over and make free the Public Library, by a large majority.

LINDSAY. endorsed the proposal to purchase the waterworks system. It carried the Free Public Library by-law by 571 majority.

PARIS. defeated by 92 majority a by-law to raise \$30,000 for the erection of a new Central School.

STRATFORD. defeated the franchise tax by-law by 22.

LINDSAY. granted a bonus of \$25,000, and Varian township \$14,000 to the Lindsay, Brantford and Pontypool Railway. Befnay also carried the bonus.

PRESTON. by 30 majority, favored handing over the management of the

electric light plant operated by the town to the Water Commissioners.
