BURIED AT THE CROSSROADS Speculation as to the Origin of Inter

ring a Suicide's Remains.

It has been suggested that suicides were buried at crossroads because it was usual to erect a cross at places. Those who were excluded from holy rites were buried there as the holy rites were buried there as the place next in sanctity to consecrated ground. It was an old superstition that the devil danced at crossroads and that the erection of a cross there-at would prevent such unseemly practices. From this or some other such superstition, such as the fear that his ghost might walk the earth, arose the custom of driving a stake through the subicle's body. These plausible theories have gained many advocates, but it is more likely that burial at crossroads was intended as a mark of indignity.

The temples, or rather altars, of the heathen Teutons were mostly at the junction of crossroads, and criminals were secrificed to the gods; hence suicides were buried at the crossroads to give as strong an impression as? possible of heathen burial. Probably, too, the publicity of such a spot, which insured the fact that a great number of people would become di-rectly aware of the degrading con-sequences of the crime, had a good deal to do with its selection. A curi-ous fact in this connection is to be found in Plato's Laws (book ix., chap-ter 12). The murderer of any of his near kin, after being put to death, was "cast out of the city, naked, in an appointed place where three roads an appointed place where three roads meet, and let all the Magistrates, in half of the whole State, carry each a stone and hurl it at the head of the dead body."-Cincinnati Enquirer. To Relieve Kempff. New York, June 29.-A special to the Tribune from Washington says: Admiral Remy is expected to re-lieve Admiral Kempff next Sunday and send him to Nagasaki or Che Foo. Official dissatisfaction with Admiral Kempff has been displayed frankly by all the authorities here. The necessity for Admiral Kempff's speedy detachment, it is said at the Navy Department, has been appar-ent ever since it was learned that Flag Captain McCalla had gone to the front with Vice-Admiral Sey-mour's constant advice, the United States senior naval officer could not be depended upon to meet the grave emergencies in discretion of his orders. Kempff has always been regarded as one of the finest sallors in this vicinity, and as good a fighter as ever commanded a ship, but he ways never proficient in dipomatic matters, and was declared to be unsulted to represent the United States at a great gathering of the naval powers. clear explanation from Admiral Kempfi as soon as the present crisis permits of a court of enquiry.
