Should a fine be paid, the court may direct it, in whole or part, to the wife or to the children. Shoemaker's Candles.

Shoemaker's Candles.

I well remember some seventy years since seeing flat candles in use. To produce what was known as the flat candle, which was also sometimes called "shoemaker's candle," two newly made "dips" were pressed close to each other while soft and then again lowered into the hot fat, thus holding them together as one candle with two wicks. The size could then be increased if desired.

This flat candle was most generally used by shoemakers and tailors, but was made use of in some households whenever an extra bright light for working or reading was required.—Correspondence the Dickensian.
