The Wonders of Knock.

The sceptical are much puzzled by the

wonders wrought at the little

country church in Mayo. They try to

account for the visions which so many in

tegent, respectable people witness by

saying that they are produced by means

of a magic lantern and phosphorus. It

would be difficult to place and to use a

magic lantern there, so that it would not

be discovered by some one of the many

thousands who throng the church daily

and nightly, and it would be difficult

indeed, by means of a magic lantern, to

produce such appearances as are presented

sometimes to only a few amongst the

hundreds present. Even if the appearance

could be so accounted for, there remain

the numerous wonderful apparitions

which do not seem to be due to any natural

causes. Of these there are a great many.

It is such as no one can pretend to

regard as the effects of an excited imagi-

nation. It is stated in a way that defies

contradiction that persons dumb from

speech have been known to utter words

which persons who had been dumb for

years had their hearing restored; that

many persons stone blind for years had

their sight restored; that limbs withered

and palsied became full sized, and strong

and vigorous; that cancers and other

sores deemed incurable were healed. No

power of suggestion could work such

wonders as these, and the only question

that can be raised is as to the truth of

the statements published. These state-

ments are exceedingly circumstantial.

The names and residences of the persons

concerned are published, and a description

of the loss or disease by which they had

been afflicted, and the names of persons

widely known who witnessed the wonder-

ful cures, and as yet, in no single in-

stance, has any one been able to discover

that there was fraud or delusion. A

priest, the Rev. Mr. Quick, well known

to thousands in England, visited the

church a few weeks ago. One of his

sons had been unable for two years, and

he had written away to one-half of the

curial. He recovered the full use of

that arm, and it suddenly became of the

natural size. How is this to be accounted

for? A Christian Brother who visited the

church. Our Lord's head hung slightly

down. His face was to the altar, as also

was that of the man taking him down from

the cross. Of these representations our Lord's

body was the most distinct; next in the or-

der of distinctness was that of the Blessed

Virgin; whilst only the head, neck, and

arms of the man taking him down from the

cross were visible. The rest of his body

being shaded by that of our blessed Lord.
