CHAIRMAN'S ANNUAL REPORT

In presenting their report for the year ending 30th April 1920, The Trustee Board have much pleasure in stating, that a most successful year's work has been accomplished.

The number of patients admitted to the Hospital was 339, an increase of twenty per cent. over the preceding year.

The receipts from patients amounted to \$10,959.39, an increase

The total expenditure by the Trustees was \$14,847,10 an increase of \$1909.35% In addition the following amounts were paid by the Hospital Aid and Auxilliaries:

Grants and subscription's have been liberally given, and our finances are in a healthy condition. Details of the Hospital work and its financial affairs appear by the reports of the Superintendent and the Treasurer.

The Board of Trustees desire to express their appreciation of the great interest, shown in the work by the Medical Staff, the Clergymen in the vicinity of Hospital, the Hospital Aid and its auxilliaries, the Superintendent and staff of nurses and others, engaged in the work of the Hospital, all of whom contributed largely to the success o the institution. We would also mention particularly, the efforts of the Secretary and the Treasurer, both of whom have done a great deal of work, without any charge for services or contingencies.

The matter of Free Patients, is one that has been receiving the attention of the governing bodies, of many of the larger hospitals, and the contention is put forward, that no Hospital should be called upon to give free treatment to any patient. The principle that people in poor circumstances, are entitled to a living at the expense of the Community, or Parish in which they reside, is fundamentally correct, and should apply with greater force, to the case of individuals in the same circumstances, who are sick, and require the best treatment possible. Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees consists of twenty members. Sixteen ed by the heavy voluntary enlist of these were named in the act of Incorporation. Four of them retire each year and their successors are appointed for a term of four years. This is done at the annual meeting each year. Under the bye-laws of the Board, authorized by legislation passed this year, all members of the Hospital Aid and Auxilliaries, and all persons, who have donated \$5 to the Hospital in the preceding year, as well as the remaining Trustees are entitled to vote in the election of Trustees. The other four members of the Board, are elected annually by the Municipal Council, the Newcastle Town Council, the Highland Society of N. B., and the Medical Staff respectively.

Medical Staff

The Medical staff is appointed at the annual meeting, and in ing degrees of opinion. the month of June in each year furnish the Trustee Board with the names of the Doctors, on duty at the Hospital for each two months.
