

GLASCOW, Scotland. — The Glascow Herald says: An agreement has been made between the Government of the Province of Ontario and the Overseas Settlement Committee for the acceptance by Ontario of a certain number of British settlers. The majority will consist of unmarried men but there will also be a limited number of married men and of youths and girls over 16 years of age. Of the mawled men, about 20t have already been accepted by the Ontario authorities in London from applicants now dwelling in the Hebrides, where agents on behalf of the Province have been carrying on a special canvass for some time past. The agents are also endeavouring to select from the same islands a number of female farm workers, and there is a proposal that a special ship shall be chartered to sail from the North of Scotland to convey these settlers in a body.




