



Of the 1919 list 273 were drunk and 57 for breaches of the O.T.A.

Day Past When Can Stand For

Ottawa Tory Paper Slams Latest Proposal as to R

OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—The Morning Journal, in a leading editorial, says: "The farmers were the first to propose a new so-called 'national party' in Canada, and now some of our fine theories are suggesting another, which are godfathered by The Montreal Gazette, whose idea of a political machine is high protectionism—we know nobody would be so vulgar as to call it hog protectionism. The Journal has expressed a view on the greatest national danger of the present, but we are free to express our opinion, also, that any increase of the scale of the present tariff, or any lessening of the British preference, or any obstruction to free trade, or any continuous revision of any part of the tariff, would be a national calamity. And that is the kind of industry which would be likely to follow the success of any political party or proposition much favored by The Montreal Gazette and its special friends. Senator MacLennan, having published an elaborate proposition for a 'national party,' The Gazette endorses the idea. As there is nothing in Senator MacLennan's proposition which is not already the principle in practice of the Unionist Government—not a word which would not appear reasonable and fitting and warranted if uttered by a present member of the Unionist Government—the question asks why The Montreal Gazette is eager to pat the Senator on the back. The answer is obvious."
