### At the R. C. Cathedral.

His Grace Archbishop Howley preached the fourth of his series of Lenten sermons last evening at the R. C. Cathedral. The subject was "Immoral and Heretical Literature." The world is now flooded with books, papers and magazines; they are coming forth from the press in a torrent. Printing is no doubt a great invention and a very useful art, but in too many instances it has been put to a bad use in printing immoral books, papers and pictures. The Church in the early days of Gutenberg's great invention actually encouraged him, and it was with the assistance and encouragement of a German Archbishop that he was enabled to make the first crude printing types and press. After printing became general abuses began to creep in and works of an immoral and heretical kind were printed and circulated. His Holiness Paul V. established the Congregation of the Index, which body had as its duty the detecting and banishing all books that were dangerous to morality and faith. His Grace referred to the "Liberty of the Press" so much boasted about in the present age. This license often developed into great abuse and scandal and injustice in the hands of unscrupulous men. The Italian paper "Assvivo," for instance, had for its sole object the vilification of the Holy Father, the Pope, and there was no limit to its license in attacking the Pope and the Church and this is a specimen of the boasted liberty of the press in Italy. In this our own country the circulation of immoral literature was not such a open and glaring evil as in other countries, still he was aware that books, papers and magazines and pictures were imported into this country, and were circulated among the young people. The business was not done openly because the importers knew that they were breaking the law. The stores and shops these books and pictures were kept in secret shelves and drawers and were shown and sold to those only whom the vendor knew could be trusted. The picture and books were most obscene and destructive of morality. The sellers of them and the readers of them were doing the Devil's work. There has been a great commotion lately in this city by the temperance advocates against the evil of drunkenness; this sign was truly bad and wrought great destruction to body and soul. The evil caused by immoral books and pictures was worse than that of drunkenness to the soul; it was more in the line of the work of the Devil. The destruction of young souls was fradulently done by the immoral posters and pictures; the old and the middle aged, too, were often the importers and holders of these immoral pictures; they carried them in their vest pockets to show them to certain friends whom they can trust. They did not know that they often create disgust in the minds of the people they show them to and they sink down low in their estimation. The disseminators of these bad pictures and books, are doing the work of fiends of hell; they are fiends rather than men. It is the duty of every pure minded Christian to snatch those pictures and books whenever they can and destroy them. The code of honour towards the people who have them need not be observed as regards property rights, because those who have the foul pictures, post cards, etc., are outside the law and outside of the claims of honour. His Grace appealed to any of those amongst his people who may hold bad pictures and books to burn them and loosen the chains of the Devil from their souls. He was pleased to say that the Catholic bookstore of the city did not any longer deal in those immoral pictures and books; they did not import them and would not keep them on their shelves. The congregation of the Cathedral and St. Patrick's can do a great deal in killing out immoral literature and pictures and works openly insulting to our religion if they would only act on the suggestions of their consciences. During this holy season of Lent the time was opportune for all to prepare for a good confession and communion and for the entering on a clean moral course of life. After His Grace and English, Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was imparted.

### Lecture By the Rev. J. K. Curtiss.

A large audience attended the Star rooms last night to hear the excellent lecture delivered by the Rev. J. K. Curtiss to the members of the Star of Sea Society on "Gladstone and Home Rule." Mr. E. M. Jackson, the resident, having introduced the lecturer in a few well chosen and complimentary words, he took up the thread of his discourse and for an hour and a quarter gave the audience a most interesting account of the life of the great Gladstone and his connection with Home Rule for Ireland. He dwelt on his attitude towards Ireland in his early political career which he helped to bring on successive coercion acts, and then went on to expostulate on his conversion to the cause of down-trodden Ireland and his self-government to Ireland in the same way as it has been strengthened in the colonies. From a close conservative in his early days Gladstone had become a Radical in his old age. He lost the sympathy of most of the Radical as well as the British party when he brought on his Home Rule Bill. The completion of his work and carrying home the fruit thereof may fall to John E. Redmond, but we should not forget the claim of honor and recognition due to Gladstone and Charles Stewart Parnell. The dramatic events in connection with the introduction of the Home Rule Bill in the House of Commons were graphically described by the lecturer. Nothing that Gladstone ever did showed his great courage to disadvantage. It was the greatest ever in the House of Commons for a century. The whole world looked on the speech was worthy of the day of Pitt, Fox and Chatham. The Bills met with defeat, but the name of Gladstone rang around the world specially among the Irish race and his friends of Ireland. Rev. Mr. Curtiss expressed unhesitatingly the belief that the granting of Home Rule would make the sons of the Empire all over the world more loyal to the King. South Africa had been given Home Rule, and who then would be so unreasonable as to say that Ireland should not be given the same boon. He hoped that one of the first duties of King George after the Coronation would be the signing of the Home Rule Bill. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer at the close.

### Fell Between Ship and Wharf.

Yesterday afternoon a sealer of the Bonaventure, who was at work discharging the ship, fell accidentally between the pier and vessel and had a narrow escape from being killed. There was a considerable undertow on and all the crew had to leave their work and placing their shoulders against the side of the ship kept him off from the pier while friends tried to get the man out of his predicament. The rope thrown to him was grasped and slipped through his hands, and it was some time before he was extricated from a deadly peril. Had the vessel been allowed to surge against the pier the man would have been crushed to death.

### Sealing News Scarce.

Yesterday sealing news was scarce, no messages having been received from the steel ships up to midnight. The young seals left are now becoming "furry" as they are taking to the water, making it difficult to hunt them. If caught on the close ice on a fine sunny day, these and the old seals can be killed without trouble, and the ships which will strike a patch under these conditions will load up in a hurry. The old harps ride the ice from the 1st April, and there is every possibility of some vessels securing good fares yet.
