## Harbor Grace Notes.

with a coal cargo to Messrs. R.  
Rutherford & Co.

By the time these notes appear  
in your paper the British Society Ex-  
cursion party will be in the city. We  
trust the weather may be suitable,  
and that the party as usual will have  
a good time.

We regret very much to record the  
serious illness of Mr. William Walsh,  
who for a number of years has had  
charge of the Bishop's farm here. His  
friends here are hoping for a change  
for the better soon, and a speedy re-  
covery.

Mrs. William Roberts, of Toronto,  
who spent the past two months with  
relatives here leaves by this evening's  
express for Toronto, much benefited  
by her visit to her old home.

Mr. E. Moriarty, who had been  
working at Bell Island is now home  
for a few days. During his work he  
unfortunately got something in his  
eye, possibly a tiny particle of steel,  
which is causing him much pain.

By a recent letter from Battle Har-  
bor we learn that Mr. Frank Moriarty  
of this town is in hospital there, suf-  
fering from a sort of paralysis of the  
limbs. Mr. M. left here to go to Mur-  
ray's Harbor, Labrador, where the  
family fishing room has been located  
for years. On his arrival he was  
stricken with this serious malady, and  
at last was forced to come south to  
Battle Harbor Hospital. Dr. Greaves  
has the case in hands, and his skilled  
treatment coupled with the kind at-  
tention of the nurses will, it is hoped,  
soon put the sufferer on his feet again.  
He speaks very highly of the treat-  
ment accorded him there. There  
were about 25 patients there at the  
time of writing.

The Higgins' range on the north  
side of Water Street, opposite where  
Paterson & Foster, D. J. Green and  
others formerly did an extensive  
business, is now being taken down,  
and boards are nailed up to protect  
the pedestrian from danger. On one  
of these boards this morning we no-

man named Garrett Congdon at one  
time had a sail-loft there and resided  
on the second floor. Mr. Barry work-  
ed with him. Mr. Shortis was, no  
doubt, a visitor to the loft, and per-  
haps will give a few additional items  
as to the occasion of putting the  
name there, etc.

In connection with the removal of  
this range of houses in the centre of  
the town, it has occurred to us more  
than once what an ideal place for a  
hotel. Now is the time for some en-  
terprising people to arrange a com-  
pany and build an up-to-date hotel  
on this splendid site. It would be

of Harbor Grace better known than  
heretofore.
