Springdale Street Commercial School.

The Springdale Street Commercial Department re-opening appears on our front page to-day. This school is doing good work in securing good positions for its pupils.

The following is a copy of Superintendent Blackall's report of the school for the year:—

Springdale Street Commercial School, July 31st 1911.

On this day I made a surprise visit to the school, and spent the day in visiting the several classrooms. I found 299 pupils registered, and 202 actually present. Since my last visit the building has been much improved, the whole of the interior artistically painted, and a steam heating apparatus installed. I understand that Mr. John Browning and certain of his friends had the painting done at their own charges. The whole of the building is kept satisfactorily clean. The rooms are well ventilated, well lighted and well furnished. The general effect is very pleasing, and the Board of Education has the satisfaction of feeling that it has a well appointed and well kept building—one of the best in the country. The sanitary offices are particularly creditable.

Throughout the school the children are particularly clean and tidy. During the year a marked improvement has been effected in the discipline of the school, and I was much pleased with the general tone of it. I found the several teachers conducting their work intelligently and conscientiously, manifesting a keen interest in their charge. An effort has been made to pursue the course of studies recommended by me last year, but it has not yet been possible to bring the several standards up to that pitch which I hope may be attained. This was hardly to be expected in one year. I certainly am of opinion that the school should be so graded that the pupils should be able to pass the Preliminary Grade C. H. E. in the 1st division before passing into the Senior or Commercial room. The work in the Commercial room is tidier and much more thorough than it was on the occasion of my last visit a year ago, and it affords me much pleasure to congratulate the management upon the promising state of the school.

The present Principal of the school has witnessed it grow slowly from a small Board School of fifty pupils with only one teacher to the large Commercial School that it is to-day, and he is now devoting more of his time to the work at the Commercial Department.

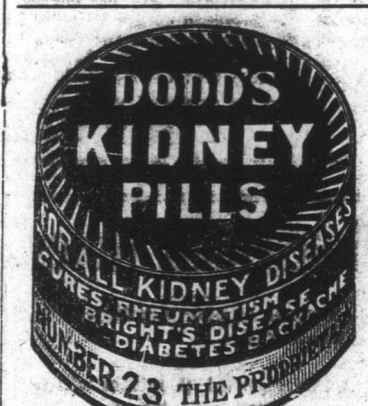
Newfoundland British Society.

German Officer Charged With Spying.

Special Evening Telegram.
PLYMOUTH, England, To-day.
Lieut. M. Schultz, 13th Hussars, stationed at Frankfurt-on-Main, Germany, arrested here on August 19th, and charged with espionage, was arraigned in open court for the first time yesterday and the Department of Public Prosecutions made known part of the Government's case. According to the public prosecutor, Lieut. Schultz was especially commissioned by the German authorities to obtain precise information as to how far the British Government was backing up France in the Morocco dispute. Specimens, copies of which were found among his belongings, were to be asked by him regarding naval reparations, fortifying of ports and commissioning reserves and ships. Insistence was laid on information coming from officers of the active list. The British Navy counsel asserted that the Lieutenant had offered considerable sums of money to local residents to procure the desired information. The residents instead informed the authorities who caught the spy.

Solway's Report.

Not Much Improvement on the Labrador.

From the Reid Nfld. Co. we learn that the Solway arrived at Twillingate about 12.30 p.m. to-day. Her report of the fishery is as follows:—"Arrived at Ilak on 24th; W. and S. W. winds, strong. Weather clear all the trip. Stella Maris reports from Cape Mungford sign of fish, weather stormy. Mungford south to Ilak schooners from 100 to 600 cts. From Ilak south to Battle Harbor, very little improvement since last report. Except a few places trapping over. Herring plentiful all parts of coast. Fishery to date not good."
