The Wilhelmshaven story is evi-

dently regarded in London as an emanation of the War material trade, which has been thriving greatly on the huge navy development of the past twelve years. The German authori-ties have stated over and over again that it was not the intention to en-large on these programmes and that the apprehensions of Britain, that the object of the naval expansion was to rival the navy of Britain was baseless and that the year 1912 would demon-strate that Germany had no programme for further huge expansions in this direction. There is a party in Germany who wish for a new programme of battleship building and its members are working for it. Sir Edward Gray has offered the hand of friendship to Germany. So far Germany has been very stiff in reception of the overtures. The Britih overtures were opportune, as they were made before any announcement of a new navy programme, and next year will afford the test whether Germany was sincere in its avowa! that the naval programme of the past would not be materially increased.
If Germany changes its avowed policy there can be only one meaning to it and Britain must reply in kind. Germany has built its new Navy on borrowed money. Britain has so far built on current income, and has not yet begun to borrow for naval expansion. Britain must retain her primacy on the seas for the existence of the Empire depends on it. This is not the case with Germany. She can exist without a formidable navy. Great Britain cannot. Sir E. Grey's overtures were therefore opportune, and what Germany lays herself out to do in the future in the way of naval expansion will be the only answer that will be

£ 10,000 GRANT.

The poultry industry in England is last to be recognized by Govrnment. The Development Commissioners have just promised to the Naional Poultry Organization Society capital sum of £8,500 and a yearly grant of £2,000 to the equipment and endowment of a national poultry institute. Conditions are that the institute shall teach poultry-keeping, train expert instructors, and make re-

Indeed, a full scheme has been al ready devised for establishing a poultry university, with biological, chemical, and marketing departments, and with special equipment for various orms of practical research, even in such side branches of the subject s the use of poultry in reclaiming

Ponations in Kind.

The offer of the Development Com nissioners is previsional on an equal sum being raised by private generosity. A very powerful committee has been formed, which includes, among many others, Sir Thomas Acland, Lord Blythe, the Marchioness of Salisbury, the Duchess of Somerset, Mr. Waldorf Astor, Captain Morrison, and several other members of Parliament Sir Thomas Elliott, on behalf of the Board of Agriculture, is taking much personal interest in the scheme.

It is hoped that some donors may ive, as it were, in kind. The first ecessity is some fifty acres of land. here was some suggestion of es ablishing the institute on land that chool of agriculture at Oxford Uni ersity. But this part of the scheme is at present vague, though all the details of instruction and of estabishment have been worked out, even o the smallest minute.
