PROGRESS
ALL ROUND!

More satisfactory news than that of the recent French and British successes on the Somme could hardly be desired. They come as one more answer to the German claim that the Allies are firmly held there, and at a time when a lull through bad weather and great events elsewhere had momentarily distracted attention from this most important of all the theatres of war. We mentioned some days ago that Guillemont, a very strong German position, had been drawn into a pocket: it has now fallen to the British arms. The same fate is inevitable to Thiepval and for the same reason. The capture of Guillemont is of great importance, for in conjunction with the fine French advance from le Forest to Clerly it establishes a very menacing line before Comblès. It will be some time before that important centre is taken, but that does not matter: what does matter is the necessity the Germans are under of defending it and of bringing up an increasingly large number of troops to do so. This is one of the great objects of the offensive which we must always bear in mind and by which we must measure its success. For the rest, the good work of the French well south of the Somme seems to foreshadow larger and larger operations there, of which the most likely purpose seems to be the gradual encircling of Peronne.

The continued ability of both the Allies to forge ahead in this methodical and scientific manner is most reassuring. With equally satisfactory omens our Allies' campaign in the East proceeds. Its general direction is worth noting. Roumania's entry might have been hailed as sealing Bulgaria's fate, as indeed it was in most quarters. This may be its ultimate result, but it is clear that it was not chosen for its immediate object. And the reason is not difficult to see. A concerted and concentrated attack upon Bulgaria would be very powerful, but it is doubtful if it could completely achieve its purpose before winter, which sets in early and is of great severity in the Balkans. Bulgaria and Turkey can give their great Allies little help, and will be kept sufficiently innocuous by General Serrail and the Grand Duke. That being so, the Allies' strategy found more favourable a blow at the weak member of the confederacy, Austria. It has been made and with instant success. Roumania holds already the keys to Transylvania in Kronstadt and Hermannstadt, and her capture of Szekely marks a rapid and considerable inroad. Coincidentally, the Russians have renewed with great power their storming of the Carpathian passes, most of which appear now to be in their hands. So great has the pressure become that it is considered possible by some that Austria will abandon the whole province of Transylvania, an act which would not be calculated to make more cordial her already doubtful relations with Hungary. It is very unlikely, but Austria's problem must be a hard one and will become desperately difficult of solution if Russia comes over the Carpathians in force.

The only other point to notice at present in this most interesting situation is the general report of the Russian advance through Dobrudja, apparently unchecked by the Bulgarian counter-demonstration. If it is at all considerable it will be regarded with considerable apprehension by both Bulgaria and Turkey. The course of events will shortly show whether there is any foundation in the frequent rumours of the intention of both these nations to seek peace before irremediable disaster overtakes them.

The Air Raids.

Count Von Reventlow's estimate of the British character will be welcomed by the subjects of his philosophizing. They are accustomed to hearing their determination to fight to the end in a righteous cause termed stubbornness and obstinacy—in fact they are fond of calling it that themselves—but it is welcome to know that their enemies are beginning to recognize its existence and what it means. It is not, however, the possession of these qualities but reliance upon their despised military abilities that allows them to regard with equanimity threats of the "destruction" of London. They want nothing better than that the attempts should be made. Here is the German balance-sheet of the last raid: debit, one Zeppelin destroyed and its entire crew killed; credit, two persons killed, about a dozen injured and a score of buildings slightly damaged—no military loss whatever. Britain will be content to let Germany do as much business as she likes on this basis. There is comforting evidence that the same high mark of efficiency that has been reached in the art of submarine hunting is being approached by the ahti-Zeppelin service, though its difficulties are much greater. There was always this material excuse for the submarine campaign, that if its losses were high it also did considerable damage; the same cannot be said of these senseless air-raids, and those who order them must know it. There is only one effective way of dealing with them, engineered as they are to please an infatuated and furious nation, and that is to bring down the raiders. Many of them have been brought down, but the fact has been wisely kept a secret in all its important details. The destruction the other day of a Zeppelin, which could not be kept a secret, will both encourage the British and dispirit the German people, to whom it is almost certain to become known. Let us hope that every succeeding raid will pay the same price.

Lukewarm Reception

To Returned Heroes Yesterday. Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—May I trouble you for space in your influential columns to comment briefly anent the lukewarm reception accorded the Churchill brothers on their arrival at the railway station yesterday evening. The matter was one of the principal topics of talk at the various club rooms last night and in most places around town this morning, and much adverse criticism, and justly so, was manifested on all sides in regard thereto. I think all who were present on the station platform will unanimously agree with me when I say that it was the poorest exhibition of patriotism witnessed for some time. In fact it was "patriotic" with a vengeance and very slack returns indeed for what our soldier young men have done on historic Gallipoli and are doing now on the memorable plains of France for us stay-at-home prate-boxes and arm-chair warriors. The Churchill officers, Ernest and Maxwell, played their part and did their bit nobly and well. They are now invalided home, having been pronounced to be further unfit for active service. When in harness they were found to be soldiers tried and true, their promotions to the rank of Second Lieutenant amply testifying that.

But to return to what happened when the train pulled into the station yesterday. The Churchill brothers were greeted by their father with typical paternal affection. There was no cheering, no words of welcome from any one else and as a was remarked, one could almost hear a pin drop. Then the heroes were given a handshake by two ladies of the Patriotic Association, one of whom I think was Mrs. J. A. Clift, after which they were escorted to a motor car by their father.
