Restriction of Exports.

Canada to Place Trade Ban on Sugar Coal and Newsprint -- Former Two May Affect Newfoundland -- Alarming Reports From Mesopotamia--Anti-Bolshevik Forces Advancing in Crimea.

SUGAR, COAL AND NEWSPRINT.

OTTAWA, June 16. A resolution preliminary to the introduction of an Act to give the Government power to regulate the exportation of any commodity produced or manufactured in Canada, when circumstances call for such restrictions, was introduced in the House of Commons by Premier Borden at the opening of the day's proceedings. The Prime Minister explained that strong representations had been made that in the interests of the Canadian people exports of such articles of general consumption as sugar, coal and newsprint paper. He asked Parliament to postpone the usual discussion of the resolution and permit the bill to be introduced forthwith. It would be referred to a select committee of Parliament, which would probably have some revision to make, and then it could be debated in the house in committee.

MESOPOTAMIA.

LONDON, June 16. Sensational reports emanating from Persia, to the effect that fresh disturbances had broken out in Mesopotamia, were met here with the statement to-day that latest official reports from Mesopotamia said that the situation was much quieter. The town of Tellaftar, to the northwest

of Mosul, which was temporarily lost to the British, is again in their hands, it is stated.

BOLSHEVIST TRADE.

LONDON, June 16. Belgium and Japan, it is learned, have decided to join negotiations which the British Government is carrying on with Gregory Krassin, Bolshevik Minister of Trade and Commerce.

WRANGLE'S SUCCESSFUL ADVANCE.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 16. Forces of General Wrangle, anti-Bolshevik leader on the Crimean front, are moving northward from Crimea and the Sea of Azov in three columns. They have been phenomenally successful against the Bolsheviks and have established a front along Kasakova on the Dniester, eastward through Welltrop, to Maripole. Gen. Wrangle's troops have captured 4,000 prisoners and forty big guns of the one hundred estimated to be in the possession of the Bolsheviks. They have lost only 800 men.

BIG GARAGE FIRE.

ROCKLAND, Maine, June 16. Fourteen buildings, including a garage that contained two hundred automobiles, were destroyed by fire in a

business district that caused the loss of six hundred thousand dollars to-day. Four families were made homeless and eleven business plants were burned. The fire started in the garage. It was extinguished with the aid of firemen and apparatus from nearby places.

BANK CLERKS STRIKE.

LONDON, June 16. The Scottish Bank Staffs have voted by a majority of eighty per cent. in favor of striking for better conditions. The English Bank Clerks Union has made rapid progress since the war, but so far no threat of direct action has been taken.

DECREASING MILITARY EXPENDITURE.

LONDON, June 16. There is no question of Great Britain increasing her military commitments in Mesopotamia and Persia, according to Bonar Law, who so stated in the House of Commons to-day. Mr. Law added that on the contrary, the Government was endeavoring to reduce its commitments, realizing the necessity of decreasing military expenditures.

ANGLO-JAPANESE TREATY.

TOKIO, June 16. Japan inserted an article in the Anglo-Japanese Alliance Pact of 1911, to remove the risk of England becoming involved in any dispute between the United States and Japan. It was declared to-day, by Viscount Kato, former Foreign Minister, in an interview urging a renewal of the Treaty.

THE BALKAN CAULDRON.

BELGRADE, June 16. The decision to refuse autonomy to Bosnia and Herzegovina has been reached by the Government of Yugoslavia and they will be governed directly from this city.

ONE PROBLEM SETTLED.

COPENHAGEN, June 16. Boundaries between Germany and Denmark as fixed by the plebiscite held in Schleswig, have been definitely established by Interational Commission at Flensburg and announcement was made by that body to-day that since its duties, as laid down in the Treaty of Versailles had been discharged, its authority in the plebiscite region would cease immediately. British forces which assisted in policing the plebiscite district are arriving here from Flensburg.

VERY PROBABLE.

BERLIN, June 16. "Nothing hitherto," says the Boerschen Zeitung, "warrants apprehension that relations with Germany, which have been initiated by American commercial and financial interests, will be hampered by the nomination of Warren Harding as Republican candidate for the Presidency. On the contrary, it is probable that they will be furthered."

ITALIAN CABINET FORMED.

ROME, June 16. Premier Giovanni Giolitti's newly formed cabinet has taken the oath of office.




