### "Rotten," is Right!

Dear Sir:-According to your re porter Judge Morris called the Prohibition Act "a rotten law." "Rotten is the right word for it. People have to pay 23 cents for a glass of rum that did not cost 3 cents and 37 cents for a glass of whiskey that only cost 11 cents. If you do not believe me figure it out for yourself. The last printed and published Customs' Returns are for the year ending June 30th, 1921. In that year duty was paid on 11,732 proof gallons of rum valued at \$12. 905.00. This works out at about \$1.10 per proof gallon. And 5 cents for freight, insurance, etc., and 50 cents for half a dozen bottles-which is \$1.65 per gallon of 64 glasses. This is less than three cents per glass. A be added at least a dollar for the script, making a total of \$2.50 per bottle.
