Rotor-Plane Tests

POSSIBLE USE WITH HELICOPTERS.

Laboratory researches which indicate that rotors, or revolving cylinders, can be employed with wonderful effect in aviation, as well as in ships, are now to be followed, writes the Air Correspondent, by full-scale tests, as applied in flight to aeroplanes and helicopters.

In the United States rotors driven by the engine operating the propeller are to be tested in man-carrying aeroplanes as an auxiliary to ordinary sustaining-planes.

In France, following experiments, the fitting of rotors is being considered in connection with helicopters of new design. In these machines, instead of there being a central power-plant driving vanes through gearing, small air-cooled engines are mounted on big revolving surfaces, shaped like aeroplane wings.

Controlled by the pilot from a central cockpit, these engines operate air-screws which cause the wings, engines and all, to rotate on pivots. This eliminates delicate mechanism and lessens risk of breakdown, special means being taken to nullify gyroscopic forces. In the front of the spinning planes it is now proposed to fit specially designed rotors, which will derive their power from the engines in these wings.

In this country the National Physical Laboratory, in association with the Air Ministry is at work on a wind-tunnel research with revolving cylinders, driven by electric motors at various speeds. Flights are also proposed to test the "lift" of rotors fitted above the wings of light monoplanes.

St. Paul's "Dangerous" Dome

London's surveyor has reported that the dome of St. Paul's Cathedral is likely to fall even if the remedies which are being applied are continued. Formal notice, therefore, has been issued to the Dean and Chapter that St. Paul's is now officially classed as a "dangerous structure". A commission of five architectural experts recommended that the eight piers which support the dome, and which are filled with rubble, should be subjected to a pressure-injection

of cement as a temporary measure, but that the costly work of removing and rebuilding the dome should be left to a later generation. The cost of the cement injection process, it is said, would be over £120,000.

"The Common Law" Great Story

Press Tributes to Arlie Marks' Show

"RECOIL" AT THE NICKEL THURSDAY.

This is apparently a week of big pictures at the Nickel. The opening attraction "The Common Law" last night attracted a huge audience and all were perfectly satisfied that they had seen a beautiful picture.

Of more than passing interest is the motion picture, "The Common Law," which is a screen adaptation of Robert W. Chambers' famous novel of the same name. Co-starred are Corinne Griffith, Conway Tearle and Elliott Dexter, while an exceptional supporting cast includes Doris May, Hobart Bosworth, Miss du Pont, Brynne Washburn, Phyllis Haver, Harry Myers and Wally Van. The story of "The Common Law" is really that of Valerie West, a sweet and rather unsophisticated young girl who, suddenly thrown upon her own resources, sets out to earn her living, but with no tangible idea as to what she is best fitted to undertake. During her search for work she calls at the studio of Louis Neville, an artist who, seeing her great possibilities as a model, persuades her to pose for him.

She achieves great success as a model but retains her sweetness and charm in spite of her environment. Neville falls desperately in love with Valerie and she finally returns his love.

Thursday's big picture is Rex Beach's "Recoil." It is a highly dramatic story with strongly individualized characters, splendidly photographed. It is from one of Rex Beach's short stories recently published in a big circulation magazine and it is full of the color, contrast and melodramatic action which the motion picture public likes to see. Its story concerns a wealthy American who marries a penniless American girl stranded in Beauville and who is deserted by her for another man. The big smashing scenes of the picture result from the man's attempt to make the woman and the man with whom she had fled live together for the rest of their lives.
