was producing ore worth \$40 a ton. After paying the various charges of mining, transportation and smelting, the return to the operators was \$1 a The tax amounted to 60 cents a ton, leaving only a margin of 40 cents profit. On this the company could not continue to operate and the mine was closed. A tax on profits, even if it had been as high as 6 per cent, would have permitted the mine operators to make a better profit and continue in business

He suggested that the Ontario system of taxing might be successfully adopted in British Columbia.

Mr. Wallinger took issue with the figures quoted by the minister of finance in respect to mining returns. It would appear, he said, that the miners of the province were in a prosperous condition owing to the fact that \$60,000,000 had been given as the value of the output. The minister should have pointed out that this value was based on the New York prices and did not represent the fig-ure which the operators obtained for their products. OF THE STARS

Runaway stars and new variable stars that periodically become bright and then faint are being discovered by Prof. Frank E. Ross, of the Yerkes Observatory, as a result of the study of photograph's plates in the obser story's files.

Various fields of stars, largely in the milky way, were photographed by rof. E. E. Barnard, who used the Luce photographic telescope. This instrument is a camera with several lenses, the largest ten inches in dia-meter, and it is mounted so as to follow the stars in their apparent daily motion across the skies. Thus these photographs show the sky as it appear ed about two decades ago. To discover what has happened in the interval Prof. Ross is comparing them with similar photographs which he is making of the same regions through the

Bruce telescope.

To compare two pictures each show ing thousands of tiny dots represent-ing stars, all but half a dozen of ers obtained the full share of the retail like a hopelssly complicated task, but The effect of the present system of the use of an ingenious instrument known as the blink microscope makes it relatively easy. This consists of what might be called a double periscope. One photographic plate is placed at each end. By osculating a small lever, the observer can see first one and then the other in as rapid succession as he desires

The stars are the same on each plate andergo no change in appearance but if one has moved, between the two exposures, it seems to dance to and fro as the leaver is moved. If a star has varied in light, the image dot seems to grow larger and smaller, while if a new star has burst out, its mage will appear and disappear.

So far Professor Ross has examined twenty-five pairs of plates in this way and has found more than 150 rapidly moving, or "proper motion stars," and forty variables, that were sky.



SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed frown lands may be pre-empted by iritish subjects over 18 years of age and by aliens en declaring intentier to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Fall information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Gevernment Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultures purposes, and which is not timber-land, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per ance west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre cast of that

Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be shalled from the Land Commissioner Pre-emptions must be occupied for twe years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least dwe acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Applications are received for pur chase of vacant and unreserved for put chase of vacant and unreserved for war lands, not being timberland for agricultural purposes; maintain price of first-class (arable) land is 32 per acre, and second-class (grating land 32.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bullett No. 10, Land Berles, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites witmber land, not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding is acres, may be leased as homesites conditional upon a dwelling beins erected in the first year, title beins obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial pur poses areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing district and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annus grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-ownering form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits are available for settlers ampere and travellers, up to the standard.
