#### Another Big Canal Scheme.

Montreal, Feb. 12. — Two gentlemen were here on Saturday interested in the canalization of the Ottawa. She was taken to Woodstock on the 7 o'clock train.

#### The Situation at Rossland.

Rossland, B.C., Feb. 12. — The War Eagle and Centre Star laid off 400 of the 600 men employed. The 200 retained will be kept at development work until new machinery is installed. Of the 360 men employed in Le Roi, 160 have been laid off, the other 200 will be kept at work opening up new ore reserves. The smelter has considerable ore in the reserve and when this is used up the probability is that it will be closed down until the War Eagle and Centre Star reserve shipment.

#### CANADIAN COAL IN DEMAND.

The Demand From the St. Lawrence Alone Will Be 1,000,000 Tons.

Montreal, Feb. 12. — The Dominion Coal Company beat the record last month by producing 100,000 tons of coal, a marvelous output for January. Mr. B. F. Pearson said yesterday that the demand from the St. Lawrence this season will be a million tons, while the Maritime Provinces will take half a million tons. Some 850,000 tons will go to the United States and out of this 600,000 will go to Everett, Mass. In September next the Sydney Steel Works will begin taking coal at the rate of a round million tons a year, so it is estimated that the total output for 1901 will not be less than 3,500,000 tons. This will tax the productive power of the Dominion Coal Company to its limit.

Brockville, Ont., Feb. 12. — The funeral of the late Judge Seukler of St. Catharines was held here on Saturday morning. The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Dobbs, after which the body was placed in the vault. Judge Seukler of Perth, Dr. Reynolds of Hamilton, and J. H. Seukler of Brockville were present.

#### Canadian Lumber for the Orient.

Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 13. — The steamer *Guesey* left here last evening with the largest lumber cargo ever taken from this port. She has three million feet on board, from the Hastings and Moodyville mills for Shanghai and Vladivostok. The largest lumber cargo ever taken before was a little over two million feet.

#### SUICIDED ON SUNDAY.

#### A St. John, N.B., Wholesaler Dies by Means of Chloroform—Eagle Shot at Toronto Island—Briefs.

San Salvador, Central America, has been visited by a fire, the total loss by which is estimated at \$1,000,000. Herbert London shot a Canadian eagle on the Toronto Island on Friday last. The bird measured 7 feet 8 inches from tip to tip.

Dr. R. Johnson, an old resident and medical practitioner, died at Thorold on Sunday at the age of 77 years.

E. T. Taylor, a well-known insurance agent, and one of the auditors of the Grand Trunk Railway, died at Montreal on Sunday.

A drinking fountain is to be erected in Brooklyn, N.Y., memorial to the late Miss Frances E. Willard, under direction of the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Toronto Junction has now 13 cases of smallpox. Every precaution is being taken to prevent its spread, and vaccination goes on apace at the Junction, East Toronto and Weston.

Dr. McKay, M.P.P., Ingersoll, is said to be recovering from the attack of typhoid fever which has laid him up for some time. He is expected to take his seat in the House some time before the close of the session.

J. J. Bostwick, a leading wholesale merchant of St. John, N.B., committed suicide on Sunday. The body was found on his office floor, with a bottle of chloroform suspended above his head. Temporary insanity caused by insomnia.

United States Consul Brush, at Niagara Falls reports that the electrical industries in Canada have doubled their output so far over the preceding year's business. The workshops are so crowded with orders that no promise of delivery at a specified time can be obtained.

What is claimed to be the record in pheasant shooting was made Friday, the last day of the legal hunting season in France, on the estates of the Baron and three guests killed 100 birds in seven hours. Come back alone brought down 635.

Rev. Timothy Casey, D.D., and Rev. Thomas F. Barry were consecrated and working at the St. John, N.B., and the other coadjutor of Chatham, N.B., on Sunday. The cathedral in St. John was crowded, and 4,000 people sat silently through a service which lasted four hours.

Saturday evening Mrs. Watson of Toronto fell backwards while descending upstairs with a lamp in her hand. The lamp exploded by striking the floor and ignited her clothing. She was burned to death, and it was not till after the firemen had extinguished the fire that her charred remains were discovered by the police. Mrs. Watson was 58 years of age. She leaves two sons, Edward J. and William R. Watson, both of whom were out at the time of the fatal fire.

#### THE WEST ELGIN BALLOTS.

Hon. A. S. Hardy, Ex-Premier, Examined by the Commission on Saturday.

Toronto, Feb. 12. — The Royal Commission, at work to find out what became of the missing West Elgin ballot box, sat at the reception room in the Parliament Buildings on Saturday shortly before noon and remained in session until about 5 o'clock. The principal witnesses were Col. Clarke, clerk of the Crown in Chancery and Clerk of the Ontario Legislative Assembly, and Mr. A. S. Hardy, ex-Premier of the Province. Col. Clarke's evidence was that he had seen the box of West Elgin bye-election papers in the vault on the day of the destruction of the general election ballots and papers. He had not seen the box or the papers since. He thinks they were accidentally burned.

Mr. Hardy was struck with amazement when he learned of the singularly unfortunate incident, which was annoying. He said in evidence that his opinion was the papers had been accidentally burned, and when asked if he had any reason to think otherwise he replied that there was no reason that he had any evidence.

The other witnesses were the messengers who carried ballots and papers from the vault to be destroyed at the furnace and the firemen, who put the stuff on the fire, but nothing was brought out to show conclusively where the papers went.

Judge Barron of Stratford, who is chairman of the commission, and Judge MacTavish of Ottawa, took notes on the evidence, but had very little to say to the witnesses.

Judge Morgan was a frequent questioner, and he made a statement that he wanted the work of the commission to be done so thoroughly that there would be no opening for anyone to say there was any doctored.

ONLY TEN PASSED AT VICTORIA.

#### Strathcona's Horse Now Moving Towards Their First Objective, Ottawa—Dr. Kenan Appointed Medical Officer to the Force Major-Gen. Huton Resigns as Canadian Commander and Goes to Africa.

Ottawa, Feb. 12. — The militia orders of Saturday state that all casualties of Canadians in South Africa will be noted in the first militia order issued after the receipt of the report.

It is also stated that the Milwaukee will be ready to receive stores on Monday, the 12th inst, and to embark troops and horses on the 20th inst.

Lieut. John A. McDonald, 82nd Battalion, is attached for duty to the 1st Battalion, the Canadian Mounted Rifles, for special service in South Africa. When he arrives there he will be transferred to the 2nd (special service) Battalion, R.C.R., and will be absorbed if a vacancy exists.

The first recruit in Strathcona's Horse arrived in Ottawa on Saturday in the person of Pte. Brooks of N.W. Mounted Police. He was the first man enrolled at Regina, N.W.T., and received permission to come on in advance of the detachment. Pte. Brooks formerly belonged to Toronto.

Dr. Kenan of the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, has been appointed medical officer of the Strathcona's Horse.

#### Strathcona's Horse—Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Feb. 12. — The special train conveying the first contingent of the Strathcona Horse Regiment will arrive in this city this afternoon at 4.30 and will part at 6 o'clock. There will be on board 20 men from Macleod, 10 from and 10 men from Calgary, 40 men from Edmonton, 10 men from Medicine Hat, 10 men from Maple Creek, 2 officers and 40 men from Regina, 1 officer and 10 men from Virden, 1 officer and 40 men from Moosomin, 1 officer and 10 men from Brandon, 1 officer and 60 men will join the train at Winnipeg, bringing the total up to 260.

#### Canadian Hay Good.

Ottawa, Feb. 12. — The Minister of Agriculture has received a report from South Africa saying the hay of the first cargo from Canada sent on the S.S. *Montauk* was most excellent.

#### Only Ten Could Pass.

Victoria, B.C., Feb. 12. — Out of 100 volunteers for Strathcona's Horse, only 10 succeeded in passing Major Laurie, the recruiting officer, on Saturday. Fifteen had been allotted as Victoria's quota, and it is not yet decided whether to close the list at once or give a further opening to-day. Those accepted are J. P. D. Armour, lately of the Mounted Police in the Yukon, and one of C Battery; G. V. N. Spencer, a native Victorian, son of David Spencer; B. A. St. George, and C. S. Fall, Englishmen resident in Cowichan; W. H. Houry, native of St. Thomas, Ont.; H. Q. Fraser, born in India; W. D. Fraser, W. C. Winkel, G. Elliott and H. C. Childers, all born in England.

#### A Soldier Wanted to Marry.

Kingston, Ont., Feb. 12. — A member of "C" Field Battery on Friday night applied to Mayor Minnes for a marriage license, but was informed the Mayor had not the power to issue the same. Then the son of Mrs. wanted to know if the Mayor would perform the marriage ceremony, but His Worship was forced to decline. The soldier boy and his lassie belong to Toronto.

Some sixty members of "C" Battery, those who were Kingstonians, were presented on Saturday with \$10 each by the city. Mayor Minnes and Very Rev. Principal Grant spoke encouragingly to the men.

#### Gen. Hutton's Formal Resignation.

Ottawa, Feb. 12. — Major-General Hutton, commander of Canada's militia, has sent in his resignation, and the Government has in due phrase reluctantly accepted it. It was received and accepted on Saturday.

Mr. Fielding's resolution regarding the payment of the contingents will come up to-day. The Conservatives will not oppose it, nor will they move an amendment.
