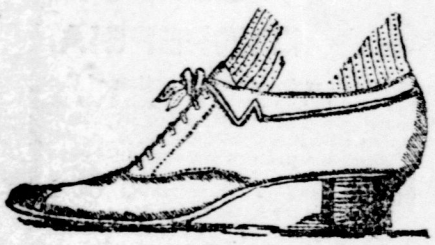

FAIR—LITTLE CHANGE IN TEM-

PERATURE.

TORONTO, June 12—11 a.m.—There is
little change in the extent of the extreme
temperatures from Ontario to Manitoba,
where the weather has been generally fine
and very warm, with light pressure and a
few local thunder showers in Ontario. In
Eastern Canada fair weather and moderate
temperatures prevail, as also in Alberta
and Assinabolia.Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Calgary, 36°—50°; Edmonton, 36°—64°;
Battleford, 46°—64°; Qu'Appelle, 54°—76°;
Winnipeg, 60°—88°; Port Arthur, 52°—64°;
Toronto, 64°—86°; Kingston, 54°—70°;
Montreal, 54°—72°; Quebec, 48°—62°;
Halifax, 44°—62°.

TORONTO, June 13—1 a.m.—Probabilities
for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes
region (covering the peninsula and as far

Wade, of Adelaide street, for non-pay-
ment of wages was dismissed with costs by
Justice Lacey yesterday afternoon. Clark
claimed \$10 50.—Major S. J. A. Denison, of Wolseley
Barracks, has gone to England to attend
the annual training of his regiment—the
Third South Staffordshire. Major Denison
will be absent some time.—Mr. C. Beaumont, son of Mr. and Mrs.
Beaumont, of Colborne street, has returned
to Minneapolis, Minn. Mr. Beaumont came
home some time ago on account of ill-health,
but has now fully recovered.—The Canadian Express Company carried
the majority of the race horses from the
Windsor meet to Montreal by a special
express train this week. The cars were
most comfortably equipped.—Joseph Shuttleworth, who was arrested
in London West on a charge of being
drunk and disorderly, was allowed to go
on suspended sentence. George Ballan-
tyne, a city youth, arrested at the same
time for taking money from Shuttleworth's
pockets, was dealt with in a similar
manner. The boy owned up to having
committed the offense.—Brandon Sun: Rev. Mr. Oaten, of the
Manitoba Conference, preached in the
Methodist Church on Sunday night last.
He has been transferred to the London,
Ont., Conference, and has left for the east.
He was accompanied by Mrs. Oaten and
child.—The coroner's jury empaneled to in-
quire into the death of the little son of
Mr. Samuel Jepson met last night with
Coroner Ferguson and adjourned till to-
night. The jury comprises Messrs. Ed.
Palmer, John B. Allenby, John Beaton,
Ed. Hurley, J. Robinson, Marshall

Water Commissioners.

a view to striking a frontage rate. The board
instructed the secretary to advertise the
time for the payment of rates in the daily
papers only.

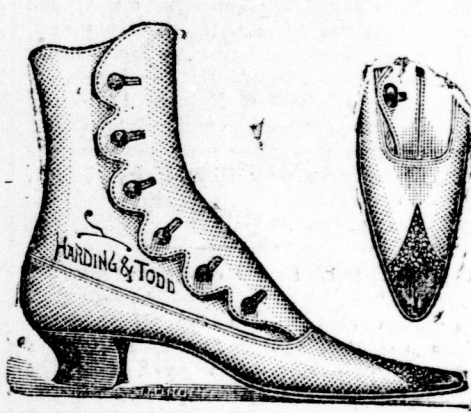
