During his first effort he refuted the idea that prohibition was an interference with personal liberty. In his second address he showed that the lawsunder which the liquor interests are guarded are class legislation of the most unjust chiaracter. Last night he plainly demonstrated the prosperity which would result from total prohibition.

In beginning his remarks Mr. Fanning said that he wished those present to take a trip with him to Bayonne, in New Jersey. This place was founded on a sand heap. The man who originally owned the location could do nothing with it, and decided to lay it out in town lots. No person wasted these.
