ELECTION IN NEWFOUNDLAND

The Liberal Victory Is Complete—Morine's
Following Gets Four Seats Only.

St. Johns, Nfld., Nov. 13.—Morine's
discomfiture is complete. Premier
Bond, with two colleagues, has carried
Twillingate, increasing the ma-
jority from 230 to 1,000. Morine's ma-
jority in Bonaville was reduced to
1,190. The Bonaville vote also car-
ried Placentia by a majority of 1,300.
At the last election the Tory majority
was 790. Bond now has 27 and Morine
4. Five seats are yet to report. Sec-
ularism completely failed to help
Morine's fortunes. Purely Protestant
increased the majority against him
sevenfold. Twillingate, under like
conditions, increased fivefold.

COLLISION—TEN INJURED.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Nov. 14.—Ten per-
sons were injured in a collision between a
northbound Lake Shore passenger
and an extra train, which met head-
on three miles south of this city yes-
terday. The injured are: N. J. Curtis,
baggage man; Grand Rapids, badly
bruised and internally injured; Thomas
Washington, express messenger; Grand
Rapids, badly bruised and internally
injured; Brakeman Adams, of the
freight train, collar-bone and leg bro-
ken. The other seven, with the fire-
men and engineers in the two engines,
escaped with slight injuries. The en-
gines met on a curve in a blinding
snowstorm.

LORD ROSSLYN APOLOGIZES

For Charging British Officers
With Cowardice.

Lord Roberts Emphatically Denies
the Accusation.

Sharp Training in South Africa—
British Now Matching the Boers
in the Matter of Strata-
gems and Wiles.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Lord Roberts, in
response to an inquiry from the Prince
of Wales, has telegraphed, authorizing
a denial of the charges of cowardice
made in Lord Rosslyn's book against
British officers in the Sannas Post af-
fair.

ROSSLYN'S APOLOGY
Lord Rosslyn, in view of Lord
Roberts' denial, has written to the
Prince of Wales, regretting that he
was misinformed and tendering an
apology in the following language: "I
over the regiments whose honor my
publication of a groundless report has
called in question, the deepest apology
and the fullest reparation. I offer it
to you, sir, as colonel-in-chief. I offer
it to the command of the various
regiments; I offer it to every officer,
non-commissioned officer and man,
and I sincerely trust that this un-
qualified apology will be accepted in
the spirit in which it is offered."

GOOD TRAINING.
There are fresh details of eight or
ten minor actions and skirmishes all
the way from Orange River to Lyden-
burg. The conclusion that may fairly
be drawn from this revival of hostilities
is that the British army is now
thoroughly alert, insured to service,
remarkably mobile and more than a
match for Boer wiles and stratagems.
The Boers are now out-manoeuvred
and surprised, and the British cannot
be entrapped, even by Dewet. Much
is said in England about the necessity
for revolutionizing the whole system
of military training. Too little stress
is laid on the fact that an army of
over 200,000 men is now having in South
Africa the most strenuous possible
training in the art of war.

HOMES FOR HOMELESS BOERS.
"Holland has expressed a willing-
ness," says the Berlin correspondent of
the London Daily Express, "to pur-
chase, on behalf of Mr. Kruger, for the
exiled Boers, a portion of German
Southwest Africa."
The German Government has offici-
ally notified the colonial council that
it will gladly grant permission to 1,000
Transvaal Boers to trek through the
Kalahari desert to territory in German
Southwest Africa.

AN EXECUTION.
Bloemfontein, Nov. 13.—Christian
Piensens, who was sentenced to death
by the military court for complicity in
the murder of James Wilson, near
Winburg, was hanged yesterday morn-
ing.

THE CANADIANS.
London, Nov. 13.—Lord Roberts tele-
graphs to the War Office on the 27th
inst. The Canadians number 11 officers
and 265 men.

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—Rev. Father
O'Leary, R. C. chaplain to the Royal
Canadians in South Africa, is being
greatly honored here. He prefers a
quiet holiday, but has, however, at-
tended a luncheon at Government
House given by his excellency in his
honor.

Pte. J. B. Bull, of B. squadron,
Strathcona Horse, was severely
wounded, accidentally, at Fredericks-
stad, on the 3rd inst. Pte. J. B. Bull
is a young Englishman, who gave his
address as 231 High road, Balham,
London. He joined B. squadron of
Strathcona Horse in Winnipeg. His
next of kin is Fred Bull, of London,
England.

COL. LESSARD'S REPORT.
Col. Lessard, commanding the Royal
Canadian Dragoons, forwards his diary
up to Oct. 1.

Pte. H. M. Marshall has been struck
dead by a bullet, having been trans-
ferred to the Transvaal constabulary.
Col. Lessard quotes the letter from
the officer commanding the troops at
Nootgedacht, under date of Sept. 9,
which expresses appreciation of the
prompt manner in which Pte. Har-
bottle, of the R. I. V. Maxim gun sec-
tion, carried out his duties as camp
senior on the preceding day. "His
challenge, followed by prompt action,
undoubtedly prevented the camp be-
ing surprised, and reflected great
credit upon himself and his corps."

His parole statement of Oct. 1 showed
142 men on parade, 87 sick and at
rest camps, 36 invalided and 1 miss-
ing, out of an establishment of 371.

CREED REVISION
Tabied by the New York Presbytery on a
Tie Vote.

New York, Nov. 14.—With a major-
ity of one vote, and that the vote of
the moderator, the New York Presby-
tery decided that the Westminster
confession, with its doctrine of pre-
destination, was good enough to re-
main as the creed of the Presbyterian
Church.

The number of votes cast was 142,
of which 109 were recorded as votes
of clergymen and 33 as votes of elders
of the church.

Seventy-one of these favored revision
and 71 opposed it. Dr. Wiley, the
moderator, then cast his vote with the
anti-revisionists, and decided the mat-
ter.

REACHING A SETTLEMENT

Conference of Foreign Ministers
at Peking

Is Claimed to Have Made Good Pro-
gress—London Press Have Little
Faith in the Concert of
the Powers.

Peking, Nov. 12, via Shanghai, Nov.
14.—A protracted conference of the
foreign ministers was held today, at
the conclusion of which there was a
general expression of gratification at
the progress made towards reaching a
settlement. It was stated that most
of the minor points had been disposed
of and that an agreement had been
reached upon several essential ques-
tions. The ministers will meet again
tomorrow.

London, Nov. 14.—A dispatch to the
Standard from Shanghai says that Sir
Robert Hart, director of the Chinese
imperial maritime customs, has been
appointed to arrange with the mini-
sters in Peking, the amount of the in-
debtment to be paid by China and the
method of payment.

An imperial edict has been issued
appointing Li Hung Chang general-
issimo of the Grand Northern Army,
vice Yang Lu.

Reliable information from Niu
Chwang indicates a disturbed condi-
tion of affairs there. Robbers and
pirates are harrying the region and
preventing commerce.

The weather is becoming colder,
with nightly frosts, but the supply of
fuel is good and the troops are not
suffering.

Hong Kong, Nov. 14.—The bodies of
22 persons who were killed by the col-
lapse of houses on the shore, in the
typhoon which struck Hong Kong last
Friday night have been recovered.
More than fifty bodies have been taken
from the harbor, and the remains of
many victims are still to be found.
The damage to crops and property is
enormous.

A DISCREDITED CONCERT.
London, Nov. 14.—The London morn-
ing papers are again agitated concern-
ing the stability of the concert of pow-
ers in China.

The Daily Chronicle comments
strongly upon the American attitude as
a feeble compromise, which it is impos-
sible to accept. The Standard says:
"American opinion on the Chinese prob-
lem is too uncertain to be considered
seriously."

Dr. Morrison, writing to the Times,
expresses the opinion that China will
"readily accede to all the terms of the
joint
