When the Bishop of Huron took the chair at 3 o'clock, Rev. John Downie, convener of the Sunday school committee, presented the report of that body. It stated that the condition and prospects of the depository were such as to afford ground for thankfulness and satisfaction, as it entered a new year of newfulness with a

ground for thankfulness and satisfaction, as it entered a new year of usefulness with a balance to its credit, the deficit of some years past having been finally extinguished. The corporation was now not only self-supporting, but also, it was hoped, proving an advantage to the clergy and Sunday schools of the diocese.

The question of the support by the Sunday schools of a foreign missionary to work in connection with the board of domestic and foreign missions was broached last year, the committee in its report to the Synod stating that this matter had been favorably entertained by many of our Sunday schools. The Sunday school committee was glad to be able to state that 34 parishes were willing to enter on the work then proposed at once, and that many others would have done so but for prior engagements. Nine of the above 34 parishes had promised to contribute between them \$183 for this object, and 200 scholars were willing to take collecting cards for the some

Canon Young moved that section 4 of this law be stricken out and the following words substituted: "In case of a vacancy in any parish where unsettled arrears of salary are claimed by the late incumbent and reported to the bishop (and in the adjustment of which the parties fail to agree) the bishop shall refer the matter to three members of the executive committee, of whom two shall be clergymen, who shall after due inquiry adjust the same, and their report shall be final and conclusive. And no appointment shall be made to such vacant parish until such finding has been complied with." Following this he also moved the exception from section 8, canon 28, of all provisions for filling vacancies.

Mr. A. C. Clark, of Sarnia, pointed out that when a congregation got behind in the payment of the cirryman's salary the bishop should immediately remove him. The non-payment of salaries by some congregations was a great evil. It had been the rule to meet these exigencies by drawing upon the mission fund. He was sorry he had been a party to such settlements. He would never do so again.


