IT WAS THE CAT!

That Stopped Niagara Power and Tied Up
a Vast Electric System.Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 15.—The great
street car system of Buffalo, Niagara
Falls and Lockport were at a stand-
still for several minutes shortly after
4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, and a
cat was the cause of it all.Some distance out of Niagara Falls
on the way to Buffalo this cat had
climbed a low wooden pole to which
the main feed wire from the Niagara
Falls power house running to Buffalo
was attached. The cat had gone up
the pole in an attempt to capture a
bird, and getting its front feet on one
of the feed wires and its hind feet on
the other wire, was instantly electro-
cuted. At the same time the cat caus-
ed a short circuit. The wires beyond
this point were dead.Clubs were used in a vigorous man-
ner to get the dead cat off the wires,
a trolley car crew and several passen-
gers joining in this effort. After sev-
eral minutes the animal was knockedoff the wires, and the electric currents
were again permitted to course their
way.The car, the motorman of which had
discovered the cat on the wires, had
come along from Niagara Falls to a
point just opposite the cat's position,
when the power suddenly gave out.
While waiting for it to start up again
the motorman discovered the feline
sizzling away on the wires, and, se-
conded by the conductor, set out to get
it down. Finally the passengers took
hand in the game. None of them
realized at the time that the cat was
responsible for the stoppage of their
car, but the moment the charred re-
mains dropped from the wire the car
started on with a rush, leaving motom-
an and conductor and the majority
of the passengers behind in the road-
way. The motorman, who is a sprinter,
caught the end of it, and, jumping
aboard rushed through the car and
