MAIDEN BLIZZARD OF PRESENT SEASON

Eighteen Hours.

UTICA, N. Y., Nov. 14.—A blizzard is raging throughout this section and North-ern New York, drifts from one to six feet deep blocking trains in the Adirondack Young Queen's Condition Is Much Worse region.
Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 14.—The snow-storm in Central New York continues tonight with unabated severity. Country roads are in many cases blocked, and huge drifts are piling along the fences. Streams are rising, and several places report threatened floods. In Syracuse sleighs are running, even in the downtown streets. Trolley service is demoralized, but the steam railways are making their time. About ten inches of snow has fallen. The mercury is about the freezing point.

Watertown, N. Y., Nov. 14.—The maiden blizzard of the season is raging in Northern New York. Snow has been falling steadily for the past eighteen hours, and the ground in this city and vicinity is covered to a depth of three inches. The heaviest snowfall is reported along the Carthage and Adirondack road, where fifteen inches have fallen. Between Carthage and Remsen eight inches are reported.

THE STORM AT MONTREAL. Mr. Persays the schools of these places are quite as good as those of older On-There are practically no rural separate schools in New Ontario, but with increasing population their establishment will follow. Mr. Pendergast's duties entail the visiting twice a year of all city and town schools, and once a year of the rural schools. Besides Mr. Pendergast, Mr. James F. White and Mr. Michael O'Brien are empoyed as inspectors in Ontario. The district of the former includes, roughly speaking, that portion of the province lying north of Lake Ontario.

Crew of Nine Men Rescued From a Water logged Steamer-Four Fishermen Saved

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 14.—A special from Port Hope, Mich., says: The steamer Emerald, from Alpena to Detroit, loaded with lumber and cedar, sprang a leak and became waterlogged in the heavy gale last night off Point Aux Barques. The life-saving crew rescued the crew of nine this morning in a freezing condition. The men could not have held out much longer. No effort was made to save the steamer, which is now drifting down Lake Huron in a waterlogged condition. The Emerald was of 348 gross tons. 140 feer over all were picked up by the schooner Three Sisters, ten miles north of Menominee and three and a half miles out in the bay. They were clinging to fish stakes, nearly dead, and had been in the water three or four hours. They had begun lifting their nets when a big sea capsized their boat. They were brought to Menominee and cared for.
