CHINESE IMMIGRATION

A Celestial Exodus to South Africa
May Be Prevented.

London, Jan. 8. — Canada is again being put forward as an obstructionist in South Africa's way. What has the appearance of a semi-official Chinese statement, published in the Chronicle today, indicates a resentful attitude on the part of the Chinese Government because of British Columbia's "odious and insidious" treatment of Chinese immigrants and the British and Dominion Governments' acquiescence. Mr. Chamberlain and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, they say, secured the annulment of the anti-Japanese legislation, but left China to bear the full brunt of British Columbia's exclusiveness. China, therefore, refuses to help South Africa out of her present critical labor difficulties until the Peking treaty of 1860 is honorably observed, and the governments of the British Empire admit the rights of Chinese freely to emigrate to British territories under mutually satisfactory regulations. It is further stated that the Chinese Government has complete control, as all vessels must clear at the customs. Through these declarations have an ugly look, they may be merely the preliminaries to cash demands on the hand mining magnates. The reports of Herr Bopp's alleged interview with Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Ottawa yesterday are published under such headlines as "The Canadian War," "Seeking a Cessation of Tariff War," "An Appeal to Canada."

ONLY FOUR KILLED

Signals of the Cruiser Wallaroo Were
Misread.

Sydney, N. S. W., Jan. 8. — The British cruiser Wallaroo has arrived here. It appears that the signals were misread, and that only four were killed and three injured by the explosion of the ship's boilers.

EXPLOSION AT LACHUTE

Cartridge Factory Wrecked and an
Employee Killed.

Lachute, Que., Jan. 8.—A fatal explosion occurred at 8:30 yesterday morning at the Dominion Cartridge Company's works, Brownsburg, four miles from here, by which one of the workmen, Dan Stewart, lost his life. Stewart had charge of what is called the dry room, where the detonators after being loaded are stored to dry. He went into the room at 7 o'clock and was heard to instruct one of the men to put on another fire, and left shortly after. The man performed the duty as instructed, and also left the building. Stewart returned at 8:30 and had only entered and shut the door when the explosion took place. The building was blown to atoms, parts of it being blown over 100 feet away, and the body of the unfortunate man was torn and mutilated beyond all recognition. He leaves a wife and one small child to mourn his loss.

BOERS ARE PLOTTING

Africander Bond Likely to Stir Up
More Trouble.

Montreal, Jan. 8.—Jan. Johannis, a Finlander who has lived for ten years in the Transvaal, and took part in the Boer war as a field cornet on Gen. Joubert's staff, and later with Dewet, arrived yesterday to study cattle raising. He says that the Boers will cause Britain much trouble yet, as in every big center there is a branch of the Africander Bond, whose object is to stir up trouble and finally to free the Transvaal and Orange Free State. They are working steadily to this end and are gaining ground daily. Mr. Johannis, himself, is well satisfied with the British rule.

THREW A LAMP

Montrealer Dies as Result of His Own
Mad Act.

Montreal, Jan. 8.—A horrible fatality occurred last night at a boarding house, No. 181 St. Elizabeth street, in the east end of the city. Alex St. Amour, a young French Canadian, a boarder at the house, with his family, went home, at the time in a drunken condition, and proceeded to upset things generally. He got into a quarrel with his mother-in-law, and picking up a lamp, threw it at her. The lamp set fire to the house, and St. Amour was terribly burned. He was removed to the hospital, where he died shortly after.

Fire here yesterday did \$14,000 damage to Marcel Beaulac's stock of decorations on the premises on Notre Dame street, and \$9,000 to Fabre & Graves' stationery stock. Beaulac was fully insured, but the other concerns were not. The building was insured to the extent of \$7,000. The cause was an overheated furnace pipe.

TIBET THE GOAL OF RIVAL POWERS

A Game of Intrigue for Control
of Land of Mystery.

LHASSA, THE SEALED CITY

Lamas Who Visit Peking Learn for
the First Time the Wonders of
the Modern World.

Peking, Jan. 8. — Tibet, the mysterious land of Central Asia, is destined to pass under the control of either Russia or England. Already the two powers are engaged in military and diplomatic intrigue to gain the supremacy in Lhasa, the sealed city of the dala lama. Russian surveys, guarded by troops, are in northern Tibet, and are building permanent barracks. Apparently they have gone there to stay. The English are assembling a large military expedition, which will march perhaps to Lhasa itself in the spring. The game of intrigue is on. China, the protector of Tibet, is not only helpless, but indifferent. The lamas themselves are only awakened to the wonders of the modern world.

The temple in the far north quarter of Peking is a dilapidated old place, highly disenchanted. The mystery of it and the difficulty of access are in the past. It was formerly the palace of the prince, who became the Emperor Yung Cheng. He endowed it richly and his successors made annual visits, liberal presents, and allowances until the year 1900. In that season the Lamas took flight and left Peking for Mongolia, reducing the complex of 800 or 900 devout folk to only 200. Fortunately for the lamas and the treasures of the temple, that quarter of the city fell to the Japanese to administer, and the lamas' temples were not pillaged and used as military quarters. Gurus stood at the gates for months before the Japanese general visited the temple and was shown through its dreary stone courts, its halls of images, and lecture rooms of priests.

When the tourist had to bribe largely to get in, and pay more and fight desperately to get out, the lamas, mentioning tales of the splendors of the altar ornaments and images, the magnificence of the food, the gold and silver found but dingy quadrangles, dilapidated buildings, commonplace images, and, over all, such dust and litter that the effect was depressing.

There are some fine old bronze incense burners of the Kieu lung period in one court. The head lama of the temple is curious about Buddhism in Japan, and used to ply his visitors with many questions. Had they any temples as large and splendid as his? Were the altars as richly furnished, the priests as many and as well robed and supported in Japan? The Buddhist chaplains of Japanese regiments sent word home, and the Hongwanji temples in Kioto invited the head lama to visit. He went over with a chaplain on a troopship, was entertained at those magnificent temples in Kioto, and at famous temples all the way to Tokyo and Nikko. He was shown schools, museums, gardens, arsenals, shipyards and hospitals—in fact, everything in the way of spiritual and material development and progress in Japan.

It was too late in the summer for the Emperor to grant an audience, but the dazed lama was shown through and entertained in the palace, and when he was to leave Tokyo some 300 priests and a great company of Japanese officials, military and civil, made a formal farewell at the station. It was a slight wordy waving, an August noonday's heat to see the dull railway platform and carriages enlivened by those hundreds of superbly glittering broad-brimmed hats, and the group of white and gold uniforms. The lama was duly impressed with Japan's spiritual conditions, and he spread the wonderful accounts of his travels far and wide through the region of lamas. The lamas, who come in from Tibet and Mongolia, stay at this temple or the yellow temple outside the walls, and there is a great going to and fro of the tattered brethren. The lama delivered a continuous lecture on the greatness and goodness of Japan to his colleagues.

and acolytes, and when the court returned to Peking and the Emperor so entirely neglected him the chagrined lama could not endure the situation. Having lost face and lost heart, he withdrew to Mongolia, seeking for consolation the living Buddha at Urga. At the Tellow Temple, just north of the city wall, there are many Tibetan lamas, and the Tibetans merchants, who come out from Lhasa and return there summer make it a general headquarters. One most interesting Tibetan lama was in at the Japanese photographer's place the other day—the Rev. A. W. Katsura, a Kampo lama, who came a few years ago as an official tribute bearer from the dala lama to the Chinese Emperor. This annual tribute is not a serious thing, consisting of carpets, drugs and incense only, since the money tribute due all goes to pay for the special prayers and masses which the Tibetans offer up for the welfare of China.

The Kampo lama was a stalwart old man, with a strong and kindly face, with a red button of rank in the well-crown of his turban hat, and while he sat waiting for the photographer to make ready for him, he looked snuff out from a little silver and turquoise pipped bottle to the side of his thumb and index, and vigorously he told me that he liked Peking better than Lhasa, and he also told me that in 1900 a Burmese lama came to Lhasa and excited the lamas with the news that the Chinese Empire had fallen and the Emperor had fled. The lamas, however, had been told that the boxers began operations, and had been asked to pray for the success of Chinese arms.

DRIGGS GUILTY

Former U. S. Congressman Will
Probably Go to Jail.

New York, Jan. 8.—After deliberating 45 minutes yesterday, a jury found former Congressman H. Driggs guilty of accepting money while a member of Congress to procure a contract between a private company and the Government. The jury recommended mercy. After the jury had been discharged, the court denied a motion for a new trial, and a reserved decision on a motion for a stay of proceedings pending an appeal. Judge Thomas told the counsel they might agree upon a day for sentence. He said: "I wish I could inflict a sentence without imprisonment, but cannot do so. I shall make the sentence as light as I possibly can. You, Mr. Driggs, are free to come and go as you please." The extreme penalty is 10 years' imprisonment and \$10,000 fine.

A DYNAMITE FATALITY

Young Farmer of Cornwall Blown
to Pieces.

Cornwall, Jan. 8. — A large quantity of dynamite, which was being thawed in the house of Mr. Ernest Froom, Post road, near here, exploded yesterday morning, demolishing the building, killing Mr. Froom, and inflicting several severe wounds upon his young wife, who was with the other occupant of the house at the time. Mr. Froom's death was instantaneous, a leg and an arm being torn from the body, which was otherwise mangled. Mrs. Froom, stunned and bleeding, managed to crawl out of the wrecked house. The ruin took fire, but the blaze was quickly extinguished by the neighbors. The dynamite was for some men employed by the Cornwall Cornwall in a gravel pit on Mr. Froom's farm. The deceased was a fine young man, a son of George Froom, one of the best-known farmers in the county.

NEW ENGLISH DYNASTY

Edward Is Not Ruler of the Han-
overian Line.

London, Jan. 8.—Pope Pius X., King George of Saxony, President Diaz, who has been elected to the chief magistracy of the Mexican Republic for the fifth time, and the new King of Serbia, are the subjects of portraits in the new Almanach de Gotha. The King of Serbia is set down as having been proclaimed as such after the "extinction" of the Obrenovitch dynasty. The word "extinction" is, of course, a polite way of intimating that King Alexander and Queen Draga were murdered in the most shocking manner. The almanach, with the authority derived from the sanction of some of the most prominent pronouncements judgment in the controversy which has reigned until now, decides in favor of whether Edward VII. of England is the seventh sovereign of the so-called Hanoverian dynasty of Great Britain, or whether he is the first English monarch of the house of Saxe-Coburg Gotha. The almanach decides in favor of the latter view, and those who claim King Edward as a ruler of the Hanoverian line are regarded as being in error. The British Empire is no longer subject to the scepter of a monarch, and the House of Windsor, and it is Wettin that must now be regarded as the patronymic of King Edward and of all the members of his family.

The only Guelphs remaining are the Duke of Brunswick and his two sons, the duke being the only son of the last King of Hanover, and the two sons, the duke being the youngest son of King George III., and who has no legitimate children, his children being ofmorganatic birth.

HAS NO CONSTITUTION

Ruler of Mecklenburg-Schwerin Ex-
pects Blind Obedience.

London, Jan. 8.—The Grand Duke shares with the Czar of Russia and with the Sultan of Turkey the distinction of being the only European countries that have no national constitution or popular or parliamentary form of government. Indeed, the conditions of government in Mecklenburg-Schwerin are almost identical with those which prevailed in the middle ages, and when the young Grand Duke, on the attainment of his majority, assumed the reins of government, he issued a proclamation, containing the following phrase: "We look for absolute loyalty and blind obedience from every possible particular as is only right and fitting on the part of subjects, vassals and servants of the master of their lands and of their person."

A previous sentence in the proclamation goes to show that it is the territorial aristocracy who are meant by the majority, as in the case of the qualification of "servants" is reserved for the merchants, the manufacturers, the master of their lands and of their person. To give an idea of the medieval conditions which prevail in Mecklenburg-Schwerin, it may be mentioned that in the theater of the capital all the best seats are reserved for the nobles, and that people who cannot boast of blue blood are debarred therefrom, no matter how much they may be "willing to pay for the places."

PLENTY OF WORK

Canadian Manufacturers Can Employ
Over 4,000 Persons.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—The announcement that 434 manufacturers in different parts of Canada are prepared to give immediate employment to 4,431 persons, including 1,738 men, 1,099 women, 1,167 girls and 417 boys, will be surprising news to the representatives of the labor unions and immigrant artisans who have been encouraging the belief that there is a glut in the labor market of Canada at the present time. This information is the substance of a lengthy report prepared for publication by the secretary of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, as the result of an investigation conducted by the parliamentary committee. P. W. Ellis, chairman of the parliamentary committee, in commenting on the report, said that it had no reference whatever to any statement that had been published with regard to general labor conditions in Canada, but had been prepared purely for business purposes, to assist the individual members who required additional help to secure it by placing them in touch with reliable sources of supply in England and elsewhere. Mr. Ellis added that the Manufacturers' Association was in no way antagonistic to the unions, as it made no attempt in its collective capacity to bring out men, but merely intended to furnish its members with the best information

Toronto, Jan. 8.—The announcement that 434 manufacturers in different parts of Canada are prepared to give immediate employment to 4,431 persons, including 1,738 men, 1,099 women, 1,167 girls and 417 boys, will be surprising news to the representatives of the labor unions and immigrant artisans who have been encouraging the belief that there is a glut in the labor market of Canada at the present time. This information is the substance of a lengthy report prepared for publication by the secretary of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, as the result of an investigation conducted by the parliamentary committee. P. W. Ellis, chairman of the parliamentary committee, in commenting on the report, said that it had no reference whatever to any statement that had been published with regard to general labor conditions in Canada, but had been prepared purely for business purposes, to assist the individual members who required additional help to secure it by placing them in touch with reliable sources of supply in England and elsewhere. Mr. Ellis added that the Manufacturers' Association was in no way antagonistic to the unions, as it made no attempt in its collective capacity to bring out men, but merely intended to furnish its members with the best information
