ANNUAL GAMES AT THE ASYLUM; A GREAT DAY FOR THE INMATES
A Long Programme of Sports Carried Out—Keen Tug-of-War Won by Packers.

To inmate and attendant alike yesterday was the most letter day of the year at the London Asylum for the Insane. It was the day set apart for the holding of the eighteenth annual athletic sports, which took place yesterday when the weather was cold and rainy, but the programme was carried out under ideal conditions.

Several hundred persons from the city watched the games and fully as many patients of the asylum intermingled with this crowd and were quite as deeply interested. A large inclosure on the spacious lawn in front of the north building was the scene of the competitions. The unhappy lot of the winners experienced feelings of happiness which formed perhaps the brightest spots in a year not altogether filled with happy incidents. Yesterday with a measure of freedom, the patients enjoyed themselves to the full. The last event of the programme, with the exception of the distribution of tobacco, candy, etc., to the patients, was the tug-of-war between the Canadian Packing Company of London Junction, and the Asylum of Two star anchor men were of course, of portly build, and could not qualify in a featherweight competition. The contest excited the keenest interest, and it was with the greatest difficulty that the crowd was kept back. The tug-of-war lasted fully ten minutes and was won by the Packing Company, after desperate efforts were made by the asylum men to keep their ground. The second pull was longer and lasted more fully the strength and endurance of the teams. For nearly 20 minutes, as many men pulled with might and main, one side would gain a slight advantage, only to lose it a moment later. No more evenly matched teams have ever engaged in a tug-of-war contest in the history of the asylum. But the sturdy packers proved to be their opponents' superiors, and succeeded finally in pulling the red ribbon over the mark, winning the trophy of many interested onlookers. The two straight victories gave them the prize.

To the judges and committee of management great credit is due because of their efforts to bring about the success of the day. On Messrs. Dr. Slipp, manager; George Angus, starter, and George Rennie, secretary, the hard work and devotion during the afternoon, and they managed the entire programme with admirable ability.
