the unsuccessful attempt of his oppo-

In connection with the London Commer-
cial College, a writing class will be
opened on the 1st of May, devoting spe-
cial attention to ladies' handwriting.
The class will meet on Monday and
Wednesday evenings, and continue for
several weeks.

The annual general meeting of the London
Board of Trade will be held at the
office of the secretary on Friday after-
noon next, at 3 o'clock, to receive the
annual report and for the election of the
president and the officers of the board
for the ensuing year.

The Cricket Club has got itself thoroughly

A VETERAN'S FUNERAL.

The funeral of the late John Becroft

1855 turned out in large numbers to

Beattie, Col. Garthshore, Captain-Adju-
tant George M. Reid, Capt. McKenzie,
Capt. Burton, Lieut. Chisholm, Capt.
Graham, Capt. Barty, and twenty or
more others. The pallbearers were
chosen from those who were sergeants
in the Seventh at the time of the re-
bellion. They were Messrs. Annandson,
Jacobs, Neilson, Mills, Jackson and
Borland.

ASKIN STREET LEAGUE

Now Has a Membership of 175—
Officers Elected.

The annual election of officers of the
Askin Street Church Epworth League
was held Monday evening.

The reports from the different de-
partments showed that the league had
progressed rapidly in every branch
under the able leadership of Mr. Maize,
the retiring president. The league has
now a membership of 172, with an
average attendance of 125 each week.

The receipts during the year amount-
ed to \$212.83, and disbursements totaled
\$204.12. During the term the league
held a week of special services, in

COUNCIL APPROVES OF ISSUE OF
DEBENTURES FOR WATERWORKS

**Ald. Garratt Criticises Com-
mission for Its Way of
Doing Business.**

At a special meeting of the city
council, held last night, a bylaw to
issue \$11,000 debentures for the water-
works department was given its first
and second readings in order that ap-
plication may be made to the Legisla-
ture at once for the authorization of
the issue.

Both readings were carried unani-
mously.

Incidentally, the aldermen discussed
the water commission and the recent
cut in rates.

"As I understand this matter, Mr.
Mayor," said Ald. Garratt, "if the
commissioners had not cut the rate it
would not be necessary for the city to
issue these debentures in order to keep
down the tax rate."

"The mayor said this was right."

"Then I am opposed to the issue,"
the alderman exclaimed. "I say, let
us do things in a business way. Let
the people know who is to blame for
an extra half mill on the tax rate."

"I do not think it will do any good
to act in this way," said his worship.
"We must keep down the tax rate at
all costs."

Ald. Garratt was not satisfied, how-
ever.

"My point is this," he said. "If the
boilers were to blow up at Springbank,
the commissioners wouldn't have a
dollar to replace them and they would
have to come begging to the city coun-
cil for money. This being the case,
what right have the commissioners to
meddle with the rates? This sort of
business will be carried on from year
to year. We do not know what will
happen next. We guarantee it, and you
have the privilege of returning it if
not satisfactory when you open it."

"There is no necessity for the rate
going above 20 or 21 mills if the city
keeps its head," the mayor said.

The council also took up the matter
of allowing the London Street Railway
Company to pave the intersection of
Dundas and Richmond streets with
vitrified brick, instead of asphalt, as
is required by bylaw 916.

Some of the aldermen thought the
company intended to pave the entire
intersection, city's portion and all, but
Manager King said it was his intention
to pave only what he is compelled to
pave under the agreement, namely, 18
inches on either side of the tracks, as
well as the portion between the rails.

Mayor Judd advised the council not
to seek to compel the company to pave
the entire intersection, as it might lead
to complications in the future.

"Keep to bylaw 916," he said.

It was decided to instruct the city
solicitor to prepare a bylaw which
will give the company permission to
use brick on its portion of the inter-
section, and the mayor was empowered
to give the company authority to go
ahead with the work until the bylaw is
passed.

Those present were Mayor Judd, Ald.
Gillan, Gerry, Forristal, Wyatt, Ste-
venson, Cooper, Booth and City Clerk
Baker.

BIBLE SOCIETY'S
ANNUAL MEETING

**Rev. Dr. Ross Elected Presi-
dent—Local Depository
To Be Closed.**

The annual meeting of the Western
Ontario Bible Society was held last
evening in the St. Andrew's Church
Sunday school. Several matters of im-
portance were discussed. It was de-
cided to discontinue the depository
after the 1st of August. A motion was
carried, to the effect that salaries of
officers shall not be eligible as directors.
The financial statement for the year
ending March 31, was read and showed
as follows: A balance from last year
of \$238.85; received from free con-
tributions from Western Ontario Bible
Society, \$545.67; from British and
Foreign Bible Society, \$298; from Lon-
don city subscriptions, \$471.70; from
sales at depository and branches,
\$258.63; from other sources, \$155.35;
making a total of \$3,036.20. The dis-
bursements were as follows: Paid H.
and P. B. Society, \$512; U. C. B. So-
ciety, \$450; for agency work, \$205; rent,
\$25; salaries, \$450; insurance, \$19.35;
printing, \$18.06; general expenses,
\$77.97; collection commission, \$30; by
cash on hand and in bank, \$1,425.32.

The following officers were elected
for 1906: President, Rev. James J.
Ross, D.D.; vice-presidents, Rev. John
Graham, B.A., Rev. Dean Davis, Rev.
James Kennedy, Rev. J. G. Stuart,
Rev. Principal Waller, Rev. James H.
Orme, Rev. W. H. Claris, Messrs.
Edward Towse, Robert Fox and Mr. Bart
Cottam; treasurer, J. F. Kern; per-
manent secretary, James H. Orme;
honorary secretaries, Rev. Jas.
Kennedy and Mr. Robert Fox; general
committee, Rev. E. B. Lancelley, Rev.
Canon Dann, Rev. D. S. Hamilton,
Rev. Dyer Hayne, Rev. B. Wall-
ley, Rev. J. J. Ross, Rev. T. B. Clarke,
Rev. W. G. H. McAllister, B.A., Messrs.
W. C. Ferguson, D. Millar, A. Brown,
O. H. Talbot, J. C. Elliott, F. Love,
H. Grigg, W. Scarlett, R. H. Mc-
Kinnon and J. E. Keen.

The president's report was read and
showed that there is a slight decrease
in the free contributions from the
branches, the amount this year being
\$1,818.21, as against \$1,824.14 last year,
a decrease of \$55.93. The city subscrip-
tions amount to \$471.70, as against
\$298.63 of 1905, but an increase of
\$29.83 over 1904. The apparent decrease
in the amount received from the
branches is due to the fact that a
number of them did not transmit their
moneys, in time to be entered in this
year's report. Nearly \$200 has been
received since the books were closed,
making the total contributions consid-
erably larger than in any previous
year.

Rev. Dr. Daniel delivered a short
address, in which he urged the mem-
bers of the society to continue in the
good work they have been doing, and
pointed out that the question before
the society is, "How is this old world
to be evangelized?"

A hearty vote of thanks was ren-
dered to the officers and members of
the board, to the speakers, to the or-
ganist, and to the session of St. An-
drew's Church for the use of their
building.

A collection was taken up, the pro-
ceeds going for the distribution of the
Scriptures.
