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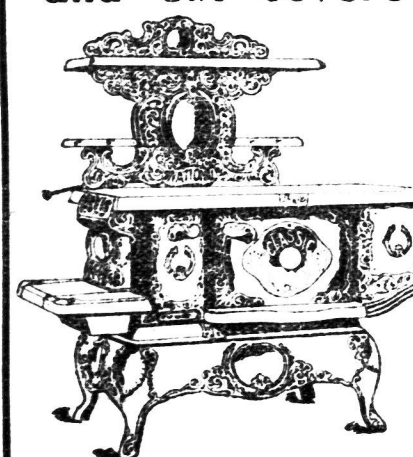

It was the first intention to hold them in the board of trade rooms, but they are too small to accommodate the 300 and more delegates who will be in attendance. **"Made in London."** Another feature that will be made most prominent is the exhibition of made-in-London goods. Display of Goods. In the city hall there will be a display of goods of all the manufacturers of the Province and elsewhere. Spaces are being taken up rapidly, and it is anticipated that this display will be a memorable one, indeed.

The public will be admitted on Wednesday evening. Tickets may be secured from any hardware store. The convention will open on Tuesday, Feb. 8. The afternoon session will be devoted to an address on salesmanship, followed by a discussion. If time permits other topics of interest to the trade will also be taken up. On Tuesday evening a smoking concert will be held in the city hall, at which many well-known artists will take part.

Business Session. Business sessions will occupy the attention of the delegates on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings. On Wednesday afternoon the delegates will make a tour of inspection through the McClary works. On Wednesday evening a question box will be opened, and questions affecting the trade will be answered.

Thursday afternoon will be spent in visiting many of the manufacturing institutions in London, and in the afternoon the delegates will be held. Friday the delegates will start for home.

The Headquarters. The Tecumseh House will be the convention headquarters. Arrangements were made with Mr. George H. O'Neil yesterday, who has taken the central meeting place of the delegates. Col. Gartschore, chairman of the general committee, and the other members, are taking a great interest in the convention, and from all appearances it will be a big session.

**TWO MEN AND HORSE
INJURED IN RUNAWAY**

Mad Race of a Farmer's Team on Bathurst Street—Collided With Coal Wagon.

Walter Stinchcombe, of 210 Simcoe street, a driver for Chantler Bros., coal merchants, and a farmer, named Johnston, living in Westminster, were injured, and a horse belonging to Chantlers so badly hurt, that it will probably die, in a spectacular runaway which occurred yesterday. Mr. Johnston was coming to the city with a load of hay, and when turning the corner at Ridout and Bathurst street, the load overtook, and he was thrown to the road.

A Mad Race.

The horses bolted and raced eastward up the hill at a mad gallop. Just as they were about to turn north on Richmond street, Chantler's wagon, driven by Mr. Stinchcombe, was going south, and before he could turn out of the way the pole of the hayrack struck his horse and penetrated its chest for a distance of several inches, inflicting a terrible wound, which bled profusely.

Driver's Miraculous Escape.

Mr. Stinchcombe was thrown from the wagon, but was not seriously injured. The horse was taken at once to a veterinary surgeon, where it is feared that blood-poisoning may develop and that the animal will have to be killed. Mr. Johnston, though somewhat shaken up by the fall from the hayrack, escaped as quickly as possible, and took charge of his team, and later went back and gathered up the hay.

**EGGS STILL SOARING
SOON BEYOND REACH**

Supply Is Terribly Short and No Relief in Sight.

If the prophecy of those who are interested in the egg market are to be trusted, the common egg is this year likely to take on the nature of a priceless relic. While the prices of all commodities are gambling quietly upward the prices of eggs are setting on an extra pace that will soon distance all pursuers. What are the causes? The dealers, somewhat ungallantly blame the domestic hen and charge that she has failed in her duty. If she, in her turn, has reasons of her own, she remains a dignified silence on the matter. There can be no doubt, however, that there is a scarcity. This has been so all along, but the past year the scarcity has become acute and a buyer can sink a small fortune in as many eggs as he could carry home in a paper bag. Dealers claim that they will yet reach six a dozen, and even at that the hens who are responsible for the supply refuse to exert themselves to improve conditions. The western markets are already quoted at 50c a dozen. A dispatch from Hamilton places the price there at 28c to 40c. At present conditions have not quite reached this stage on the London market, but they are tending in that direction. Eggs can still be bought here for 20c, but they are very scarce at that price, and some sellers have asked and received as high as 50c, and even higher prices have been reported.

With the western market so high there is little likelihood of any change in the way of relief here. Naturally, too, the price of stored eggs is going up. This is the better reason why the fact you can't boil and you can't poach this variety, but, disguised, they are very useful for cooking purposes, and the knowledge that they, too, are on the upward way will send a pang of sorrow to every thrifty housewife's heart.
