

EGGS STILL SOARING SOON BEYOND REACH

Supply Is Terribly Short and No Relief in Sight.

If the prophecy of those who are interested in the egg market are to be trusted, the common egg is this year likely to take on the nature of a pricetrusted, the common egg is this year likely to take on the nature of a price-less relic. While the prices of all commodities are gamboling quietly upward the prices of eggs are getting on an extra pace that will soon distance all pursuers. What are the causes? is a question that naturally presents itself. The dealers, somewhat ungaliantly blame the domestic hen and claim that she has falled in her duty. If she, in her turn, has reasons of her own, she retains a dignified silence on the matter. There can be no doubt, however, that there is a scarcity. This has been so all along, but in the past month the scarcity has become acute and a buyer can sink a small fortune in as many eggs as he could carry home in a paper bag. Dealers claim that they will yet reach 60c a dozen, and even at that the hens who are responsible for the supply refuse to exert themselves to improve conditions. The western markets are already quoting eggs at 50c to 60c. A dispatch from Hamilton places the price there at 38c to 40c.
