HIGH PRICES AND THEIR

The majority report of the special committee of the United States Senate, appointed to inquire into the causes of high prices, is so voluminous that none of the great daily newspapers have found space for it in full. Accompanying the report are figures compiled by the bureau of labor. It is explained that part of the discrepancy may be due to a greater proportionate increase in retail than in wholesale prices, because of increasing expenses.

The difference in the rate of increase is startling, when the 257 commodities are separated into classes. Farm products went up during the last ten years 39.8 per cent, against an increase of 12 per cent for cloths and clothing, 6.0 per cent for fuel, 5.3 per cent for house furnishing goods, and 3.6 per cent for metals and implements.

Senator Lodge and the other Republican members of the committee have all along denied that the high cost of living was to be ascribed in any measure to the workings of the high protective tariff system. Among the fifteen causes to which the report attributes higher prices, neither the tariff nor the trusts are included.

The Democratic members of the committee have not yet prepared their report, but it is known that it will declare that the rising index number is mainly the outcome of the tariff.
