**A BUSY TIME
FOR NEW BISHOP**
Gifts and Congratulations Are
Pouring in on Rev. Father
Fallon, Who Is Now in
London.
CROZIER FROM K. OF C

Signet Ring From Warm Friend in
Ottawa—Vestments Given By
Buffalo Congregation.

The final arrangements for the con-
secration of Bishop Fallon on Monday
at St. Peter's Cathedral have all been
completed, and the ceremonial will be
the most impressive ever witnessed
in this city.

His lordship will have a busy time
from now until the consecration, mak-
ing preparation for this most impor-
tant event.

This afternoon, the Knights of Col-
umbus, of this city, will present him
with a crozier, and many of the
clergy and laity of the diocese will be
present.

This evening, Archbishop McEvay,
the consecrator, will arrive, and will
be driven immediately to Mt. St.
Joseph, where he will go into retreat
with Bishop Fallon.

Neither will take part in the ser-
vices in the city churches tomorrow.
They will attend mass in Mt. St.
Joseph chapel.

The Episcopal Ring.
A number of presentations will be
made prior to the consecration. A
former parishioner of Bishop Fallon's
in Ottawa, Mr. M. P. Davis, will pre-
sent him with the episcopal ring. It
is of solid gold, and is one of the
handsomest pieces of jewelry ever
turned out in the Capital City.

A chalice of gold was presented to
his lordship by a friend in Tewkes-
bury, Mass., while the Knights of Col-
umbus presented him with the crozier
and gold chain. His vestments were
the gift of his old congregation in Buf-
falo, and are particularly handsome.

Other gifts are pouring in upon his
lordship, and his secretary is having a
busy time attending to the messages
of congratulation and gifts.

The Addresses.
In addition to the addresses to be
presented to him on Monday by Mr.
Meunier, on behalf of the clergy of the
diocese, and by Senator Coffey on
behalf of the laymen, Mr. W. J. Kane,
of Ottawa, will read an address from
the Ancient Order of Hibernians, of
Ottawa.

In this address reference will be
made to the stand Bishop Fallon took
some years ago in connection with
the coronation oath Catholics were com-
pelled to take, and which was con-
sidered unjust. The criticisms of
Bishop Fallon at that time made his
name known from one end of the Do-
minion to the other.

The visiting clergymen will be bil-
leted with prominent Catholics
throughout the city. The archbishops
of St. Boniface, Montreal and Kingston
will be guests at St. Peter's Palace, as
will also Mr. Shahan, the distinguished
Washington divine.

Hon. Charles Murphy will be enter-
tained by Mr. Phil. Pocock, and he
later will also entertain one of the
prominent ecclesiastics.

A Family Gathering.
A unique family gathering will be
that of Bishop Fallon's family. His
aged father and mother will arrive to-
night from Cornwall, and will be en-
tertained at the Sacred Heart Acad-
emy.

Six brothers of the bishop will
also be present. One of them is Rev.
Jas. P. Fallon, O. M. L., of Ottawa,
a well-known and justly popular priest
of that city, and like his brother, a fam-
ous football player. Rev. C. A. Fallon,
O. M. L., of Tewkesbury, Mass.; I. Frank
Fallon, in the department of secretary of
state, Ottawa; and Joseph, Thomas
and Vincent, all prominent contractors
of Cornwall.

Rev. Father Ashward has not re-
ceived the names of the visitors in
full, but there will be a very large at-
tendance.

St. Peter's parish hall is being rush-
ed ahead as rapidly as possible for the
ecclesiastical dinner to be given there
on Monday, and the auditorium will
be ready for the entertainment.

The Consecration.
The details are all complete, and the
consecration ceremony will be one of
the most imposing ever witnessed in
this city.

Archbishop McEvay, of To-
ronto, formerly bishop of Montreal, will
be consecrator, and among the clergy
who will be present are: Archbishop
Bruchési, St. Boniface; Archbishop
Bruchési, Montreal; Archbishop Gau-

Sunday morning. Rev. Father Nolan,
O.M.L. of Lowell, Massachusetts, will
be the preacher the pontifical res-
pers, and will preach at the cathedral
on Sunday evening.

All the priests of the diocese, ex-
cept those residing in the north, will
be present at the consecration.

A number of the priests in the north
cannot come on account of the time
at which the consecration takes place,
and there being no early morning
service, they will, however, arrive on
the first train over the Huron and
Bruce, and will attend the dinner,
which will be held in St. Peter's Pa-
rish Hall.

A Reception.
A special reception will be held in
honor of Father Fallon's aged parents
and his six brothers, all of whom will
attend the consecration. The reception
will be held in the evening in the
Sacred Heart Convent.

Hon. Charles Murphy, secretary of
state, is coming with a large party of
Knights of Columbus from Ottawa,
Montreal and other eastern cities. A
special train will be run from Buffalo
and will bear a large number of
Father Fallon's personal friends from
that city. Knights of Columbus are
also coming in large numbers from
other points.
