MOTHER KILLS SON

KEEPS DEATH VOW
Promised Dead Husband She Would Not Let Him Live.

Terrible Arrangements Made By Farmer, Proprietor, Who Feared His Wife and Boy Might Suffer By Poverty.

Oxford, Maine, Feb. 12.—Mrs. Leonard S. Keene shot her 14-year-old son Gerald, and then killed herself as a result, it is said, of an arrangement she made with her husband, whose death occurred on Saturday. According to a document found by the coroner, the arrangement was made about a month ago.

The paper set forth that Mrs. Keene was a widow, and that her husband had been killed by a train. She was left with a young son, and a large debt.

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SALOON SHOULD BE COUNTERACTED

Rev. H. H. Bingham's Address on "The Morals of the City."

WORK FOR THE CHURCH
Pastor Finds Conditions in London Clean, But This Is Because There is No Congestion of Population.

"The Morals of the City" was the title of an address given by Rev. H. H. Bingham at a mass meeting for men in Talbot Street Baptist Church yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Bingham opened by stating that he was not dealing with the morals of London particularly, but the existing conditions of the greater city.

"During the short time I have been in London," said the speaker, "I have been impressed with its beauty, its wide streets, its happy homes, and its splendid moral conditions, but all we would need in this city of London would be congested population to bring here the evils and wickedness of the large cities."

Evils of the City.
Mr. Bingham then dealt with the different evils to be found in any city.

"The saloon," he said, "is the centre and sphere of all the trouble. It controls the city's morals, and it is the worst enemy of modern city life today. The saloon is the great social gathering place of the workingman, and it is the worst enemy of modern city life today."

The speaker then quoted from the words of Clement Scott, of Boston, a man who had experienced thirty years of stage life, and stated that it was practically impossible for a woman to enter the life of the stage and retain her purity.

The extreme in society and the extreme in the stage were also touched upon as a menace to the morals of any city.
