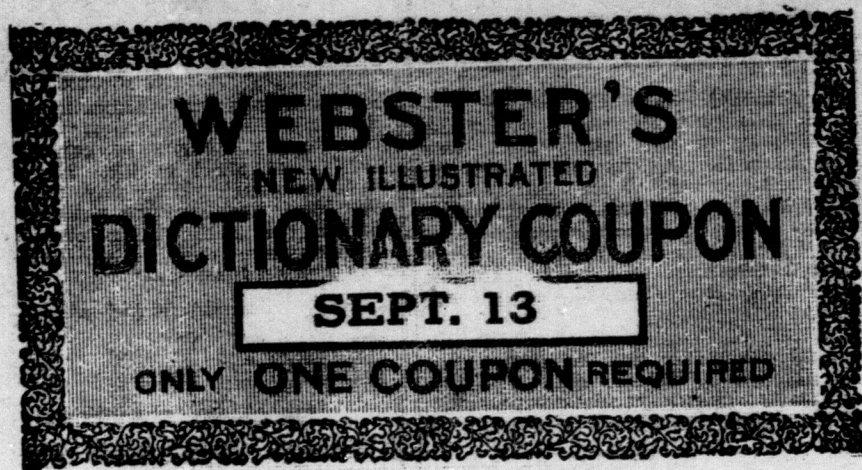




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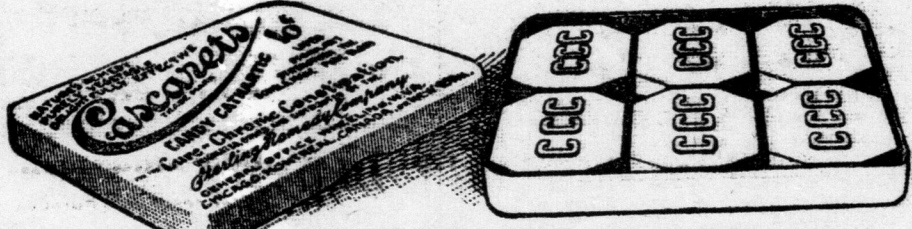

CHURCHILL HAS PLAN FOR PROVINCIAL GOVT

Declares Irish Home Rule Is Forerunner of a Genuine System of Government in All Four Countries of the United Kingdom.

Dundee, Sept. 12. — In a speech here today, Winston Churchill outlined a system of federation for Great Britain.

He said that England alone was too large for a single Parliament, which would be strong as an Imperial Parliament, and conflict of opinion would be disastrous. He suggested that England should be broken up into provinces, such as Lancashire, Yorkshire, Midlands, and London, and

pointed out that the United States conducted its business through a larger number of Parliaments in proportion to population than if there were ten or twelve parliaments in the United Kingdom.

The British Government, said the First Lord of the Admiralty, intended Irish home rule to be the forerunner of a genuine system of self-government in all four countries of the kingdom.

TOOK WRONG BOTTLE AND DRANK POISON

Little Teeswater Lad Had a Very Close Call for Being Killed.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Teeswater, Sept. 12. — The young son of Mrs. A. Watson narrowly escaped a tragic death yesterday. The lad wanted an empty bottle, and going to the medicine cabinet to look for one, made a serious mistake by trying the contents of one, and swallowed a big dose of Iodine.

His mother at once administered antidotes, and worked with him for an hour until the danger was past. Between 1 and 2 o'clock yesterday morning, Mr. and Mrs. Humphrey discovered that their house was on fire. An alarm was given, and the fire brigade succeeded in saving most of the building. It seems some fire had been smoldering all night when the chimney caught. There is no insurance, as the policy had run out only a few days before.

BOOMING WHEATLEY

Splendid Concrete Wharf Is Being Built to Handle Traffic.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Wheatley, Sept. 12. — Wheatley is to be a Government lake port and will have one of the best harbors on the Canadian side.

A concrete wharf costing between \$35,000 and \$40,000 is now under construction, and crabs, which were towed to Wheatley from Rondeau, are being filled with rock and sunk for the initial piers.

The new wharf will, it is expected, prove of much benefit to Lake Erie fishing tugs, and it is also hoped to see one of the passenger lines call. Vessels under 16 feet draft will be able to land at the new wharf.

BADLY BEATEN

Molders Mistook Traveller for Strike-Breaker and Attacked Him.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Windsor, Sept. 12. — Mistaking him for a strike-breaker, a gang of striking molders at the Michigan Steel Casting Co.'s plant in Detroit set upon and terribly punished Joseph J. Gawley, of Windsor, yesterday afternoon. Gawley, who is a travelling salesman, had just left the offices of the Castings Company when he was knocked down and pounded unmercifully. His nose was broken, and he suffered several long deep cuts in the face, and was beaten over the back.

His wounds were dressed by a physician, and he was taken home. None of the assailants were arrested.

STRONGER CHURCHES TO AID THE WEAKER

Amherstburg Baptist Association is in Convention in This City.

The 72nd annual convention of the Amherstburg Baptist Association is being held this week in Cullis Hall. About 50 delegates are present from the fourteen churches of the association, which includes all the territory from Toronto to Amherstburg.

The meetings so far have been marked with enthusiasm, and the reports of the various committees have been accepted as most encouraging. A special interest is being taken by the stronger churches in behalf of the weaker ones. Financial aid is to be given them, and the pastors of the larger churches will visit more frequently the smaller congregations.

The vice-moderator, Rev. R. L. Brady, of Detroit, during the course of his address on Thursday, said that their denomination possessed the strongest set of pastors at the present time ever in the history of the association.

In the opening session Thursday, Rev. J. C. Nicholas, B. D., the local pastor, welcomed the visitors to the convention and this was responded to by Deacon Dorsey, of St. Catharines. In the afternoon Pastor Nicholas read a paper based on the relation of church and state. This was followed by a most inspiring address by Moderator E. E. Thompson, of Windsor, and it presented a most sanguine outlook for the future.

At this morning's session Rev. R. L. Knight, B. A., a recent McMaster honor graduate, read a paper on the subject, "Baptists and Missions," in which he outlined the work being done by their church in the mission field.

This afternoon and evening the regular Sunday school session of the convention is being held, and on Sunday the visiting clergy will occupy the pulpits of the city churches.

Two men killed and wife of one suicides.

Level Crossing Accident at Quebec Village Cause of Triple Tragedy.

[Canadian Press.] Trois Pistoles, Que., Sept. 12. — Two men, Alfred Gagnon and Arsene Ouellette, were killed on the Intercolonial Railway today, and the wife of Ouellette committed suicide when the body of her husband was taken home.

The men were out driving, and their rig was struck on a level crossing. Gagnon and Ouellette were terribly mutilated.

When Ouellette's body was taken to his home his wife looked at it and then, rushing shrieking into a back room, stabbed herself in the throat with a table knife.

The Ouellettes had only been married a short time.

JEWISH NEW YEAR IS BEING OBSERVED

Special Celebrations Will Continue For Some Days.

Local Hebrews are today celebrating the first day of the New Year 5673. The special celebrations in connection with the New Year commenced on Thursday at sunset, and will continue for some days. Special religious services held in the local synagogues today were largely attended, and the rabbis conducted the usual rites. All places of business are closed.

DOMESTIC SERVANT CLEARED OF CHARGE

Magistrate Believes She Secured the Money From Husband.

Edith Willis, a domestic, who was charged by a down-town merchant with the theft of \$13, was discharged in the police court this morning by Magistrate Judd. The evidence for the prosecution did not sustain the charge, the information having been laid solely on the fact that the woman was known to have had \$5 in her possession, with which she made a payment on a ring at a local jeweler's.

Henry Willis, the woman's husband, who is a farm laborer near Thamesford, was a witness in court, and he testified that he had given his wife the \$5 with which she had purchased the ring. He offered to produce witnesses who could bear him out. This was not deemed necessary by the magistrate, the evidence against the woman being of so light a nature that he dismissed the case.

GIBSON CASE POSTPONED

New York Lawyer Will Not Be Arraigned Until Sept. 24.

[Canadian Press.] Middletown, N. Y., Sept. 12. — The examination of Burton W. Gibson, the New York lawyer, on the charge of murdering his client, Mrs. Rosa Menzchik Szabo, in Greenwood Lake, July 16, was postponed today until Sept. 24 and Gibson was ordered locked up meanwhile in the county jail at Goshen. The postponement was granted upon application of District Attorney Rogers, with Gibson's consent.

SOW FALL WHEAT

Farmers Around Parkhill Have Finished Cutting Their Oats.

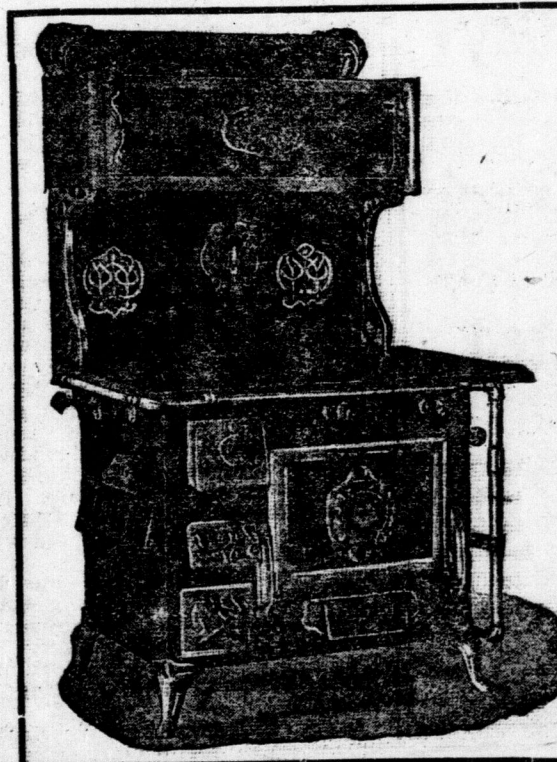
