RUMOR IN KITCHENER MR. MILLS TO RESIGN

Registration Said To Be Objective,
But Post Not Vacant.

KITCHENER, Sept. 18.—There was persistent rumor on the streets today that Charles H. Mills, M.P.P., would shortly resign his seat in the legislature to accept the appointment of registrar of Waterloo County.

It was learned today that another gentleman is anxious for the position should Mr. Moore decide to resign.

GREEK ISLANDERS PLEAD WITH KING TO ACT

Ask Him to Adopt a Policy That Will
Save the Nation.

PARIS, Sept. 18.—The populations of Mytilene and Lemnos have addressed appeals to King Constantine, beseeching him to adopt a national policy and save the nation and his throne, says a dispatch to the Havas Agency from Athens.

"Colonel Lelakis, who is now at Saloniki," says the correspondent, "declares that Commander Hadjopoulos of the Kavala garrison, announced to the officers there that Field Marshal von Hindenburg had assured him that the Greek army had been made prisoner as a result of Bulgaria's demand. Former Premier Venizelos went on learning that the colors of a certain regiment at Kavala had fallen into the hands of the Bulgarians."

CANADIANS MADE ADVANCE OF ONE THOUSAND YARDS IN HALF HOUR'S FIGHTING

Went Into Battle Like Boys at a Picnic—Germans Not Killed or Wounded Surrendered or Ran Like Rabbits.

TORONTO, Sept. 18.—A special cable to the Evening Telegram contains the following account of the part the Canadians played in the battle of last week by which they helped in the capture of Mouquet farm and the Danube. How a Canadian division participated in the trench.

In the glorious and great advance of Friday morning, when the Huns were swept back with irresistible force by the British army, was related to me by an officer from Dundas, Ont., who was slightly wounded in the charge.

"Our Ontario boys were just been mustered for it to start," said he. "Just before the time appointed the Huns in the trench opposite my battalion seemed to get wind of the game, for they started in throwing bombs of a new kind, black in color and about the size of an apple, which don't do much damage, but make a loud explosion. A few minutes later my artillery barrage lifted and we moved forward from the trenches at 6.30. The next thing we were taking shelter in shell holes in front of the German trenches, which were just fifty yards off."

"At this point a man beside me called 'Look there,' and right in front of us were Germans, apparently Bavarian troops, standing up, their shoulders above the parapet, firing at us. I could scarcely believe it till I saw their square caps. They were only 25 yards off. I shot one dead and another upon them with a rush, driving them out. Those not killed or wounded ran like rabbits, while numbers surrendered."

Enthusiastic Crowd.
"Our objective was Martinpuich, a thousand yards away. You never saw such enthusiastic men as ours. They grabbed souvenirs when we stopped fast enough to keep up the Canadian rush. Our lads seemed to think it a picnic, laughing and joking at the Huns' discomfiture."

"Thus we made the thousand yards in the scheduled thirty minutes. The Germans, nevertheless, are not at all disposed to give way to any illusion that the British army has been completely weakened, although it is asserted in official circles that the latest battle has been a complete success."

On Sunday when the Germans were making counter-attacks, and among other things, regaining a portion of the lost village of Martinpuich, both the British and French continued their efforts at various points along the line, particularly at Combles, Thiepval and Comblanchien. These efforts, it is announced, were brought to a standstill. The French concentrated their efforts at Combles, but were thrown back.

The belief is held in Berlin that even if Germany's opponents have not been completely weakened, a continuance of the attack with their former intensity is an impossibility, because the Anglo-French offensive, especially that of last week, cost them so heavy.

Reports from the front reiterate that little as the German troops like to retreat, this policy is preferred, if thereby lives are saved, the expense of comparatively unimportant territory.

Search for Bodies.
The wharf watchman at Launon, some seven miles down the river from the site of the disaster, reports today that the bodies of two men floating with the ebb tide yesterday afternoon, and search is being made down the river and along the shores to recover them.

BANDITS GET \$66,000

LAREDO, Tex., Sept. 18.—Bandits held up a passenger train September 17 near Tancopa, rifled the express of \$66,000 in gold, robbed the passengers and then pushed the train down the mountainside into a deep canyon, according to an apparently reliable report reaching here today. The passengers were permitted to detain, thus preventing loss of life, the report said.

On the following day, according to the report, a Constitutional troop train sent out to apprehend the bandits was blown up, at the same spot the holdup occurred, resulting in the death of 40 soldiers.

STRONG POSITION FALLS TO BRITISH; 1,000 YARDS HELD

Work Near Ginchy Taken by Haig's Troops.

MORE PROGRESS MADE

Five Hundred Prisoners Taken on Western Front in 24 Hours.

LONDON, Sept. 18.—The British line has been advanced a thousand yards along a one-mile front, says the official statement from general headquarters issued tonight. A powerfully-fortified German work, known as "The Quadrilateral," near Ginchy, has fallen completely into British hands.

Progress was also made north of Fiers, where heavy German counter-attacks were repulsed.

Other British gains were announced this afternoon. The position north of Martinpuich was improved, the line was advanced east of Courcellette and a further portion of the enemy trench system was taken south of Thiepval.

South of Combles the French have carried another group of German trenches, according to the official statement from the French war office tonight. Desperate fighting continues around Denicourt, while actions both in the Champagne district and on the Verdun front, where the French captured a trench in Deadman's Hill, are recorded.

British Official Report.

The text of the British statement reads:

"South of the Ancre our troops made another important advance today. A strongly-fortified German work, situated between Bouzies wood and Ginchy, known as 'The Quadrilateral,' which hitherto resisted our efforts, has fallen completely into our hands."

As a result of this capture our line has been advanced to a depth of out a thousand yards along a one-mile front.

"Seven machine guns and numerous prisoners were taken in the course of this very successful operation."

"Enemy counter-attacks north of Fiers were driven back with loss and we made progress. Hostile troops massing for a counter-attack at Lesceux and Mort were caught by our artillery and dispersed."

"Besides the guns already reported since the morning of the 15th, we have taken five heavy howitzers, two field guns, three heavy and three light trench mortars, and a number of machine guns. The total number of prisoners taken in the past 24 hours is 10 officers and 500 men."

"There was considerable aerial activity yesterday. Several enemy machines were driven down. Four of our machines were missing."

French Report.

The statement issued by the French war office tonight says:

"North of the Somme a brisk attack gave us the mastery of a group of trenches 200 metres south of Combles. We took 50 prisoners."

"Violent artillery fighting continues in the sectors of the Bethune road. 'South of the Somme fierce fighting continued at Denicourt. Our infantry after capturing the village and the last of its defenders has driven back the enemy's advanced posts to a distance of about a kilometre to the south, in the direction of Ablancourt."

"Simultaneous operations enabled us to occupy a trench west of Horny, and oust the enemy from three small woods southeast of Denicourt, and also to occupy several trenches to the southwest."

"The total number of unwounded prisoners taken Sunday and Monday in this sector exceeds 1,600, of whom 25 are officers."

"In Champagne there was considerable artillery activity on both sides in the region west of the Souain-Somme road."

"On the left bank of the Meuse (Verdun front) we captured a German trench on the southern slopes of Dead Man Hill, some prisoners remaining in our hands."

"The day was calm on the rest of the front."

Gain Near Clercy.
The capture of a trench east of Clercy, near the Peronne road, was announced in a French official statement made this afternoon, as follows:

"To the north of the river Somme we have occupied a trench 100 metres east of Clercy and repulsed the counter-attacks of the enemy at this point. To the south of the river the enemy last night delivered several counter-attacks against our trenches located to the east of Clercy and the south of Denicourt. In this latter region the Germans delivered no fewer than three violent attacks. Each one was repulsed with heavy losses for the enemy."

"To the south of Clercy as well as immediately to the east of Denicourt we have made further progress. The latter point is completely encircled."

"The number of prisoners counted up to the present time reached 1,200. Also ten machine guns of the enemy are now in our hands."

According to information obtained from some of these prisoners, the losses inflicted during the fighting of yesterday in the vicinity of Bery upon the tenth division of German reserves and upon the one hundred and twentieth reserve regiment were enormous. Two battalions of the 28th regiment, 11th division, were almost annihilated by our artillery."

"There has been nothing of importance to report from the remainder of the front."

"Flight-Adutant Tarsacq has brought down his rich enemy machine. This aeroplane fell near Denicourt. The same day Flight-Lieut. Huertaux brought down his seventh German aeroplane."

"French air squadrons have conducted various bombardments. Twelve shells have been thrown down on the railroad station at Nantillois, and 23 missiles thrown down at Villers-Carles and Horny, from an altitude of 800 yards, caused serious damage."

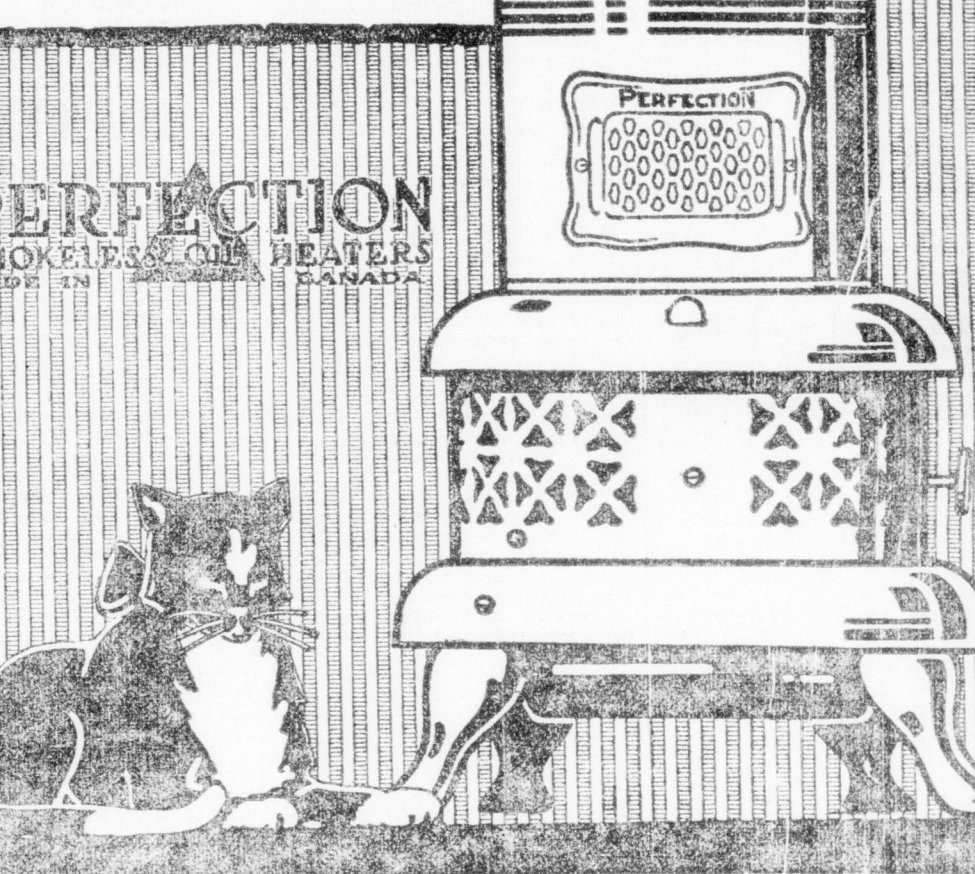

GERMAN PLANES OFF FLANDERS.
BERLIN, Sept. 13, via Sayville.—Hostile craft off the Flanders coast were successfully bombed yesterday by German hydroplanes, the admiralty announced in a statement today, which says: "German naval aeroplanes from

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
