FRENCH DOUBTFUL IF GERMANY WILL BE ABLE TO PAY

Cabinet May Resign As Result of Dissatisfaction.

the new German cabinet is most unstable. The crucial test is regarded here as likely to come on June 30 with the expiration of the time limit for the complete disarmament of Germany. If the Allied conditions are not complied with by that date, it is declared in official circles, the Ruhr will be occupied, even if Germany pays the 1,000,000,000 gold marks within a month, as provided in the reparations commission's schedule. A large element in the Chamber, dissatisfied with the decisions of the last London conference, is planning an assault on the Briand ministry. The attack will be led by M. Tardieu and M. Fergot. Premier Briand will defend the decision to give Germany time to reply to the Allied ultimatum and stake the fate of his cabinet upon approval by the Chamber of the London decision. If the Chamber pronounces against those decisions the cabinet will resign.

INGERSOLL CADETS INVITED TO LONDON

Corps Made a Splendid Showing At the Annual Inspection.

INGERSOLL, May 11.—Lieut.-Col. McCrimmon of London inspected the Collegiate Institute cadet corps at the Victoria Park this afternoon. The cadets presented a splendid appearance, and their discipline was much admired. They were congratulated by the inspecting officer, and urged to attend the cadet camp at London in July for military district No. 1, at which it is expected there will be 1,500 cadets.

There were scores of delighted visitors today to the beautiful garden of F. P. Lake, Mill street, the occasion being the annual display of the Horticultural Society. The garden of President Lake was a favorite choice with 2,000 tulips in bloom. They embodied about 125 varieties. Much information was given by Mr. Lake in regards to cultivation and the varieties grown. The attendance was much larger than any previous show of the society.

MORNINGTON FAMILY AGAIN BEREAVED

LISTOWELL, May 11.—Leslie Simpson, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Simpson, Mornington Township, reported on the high road to recovery after a visit to the healing mission being conducted by Rev. F. F. Bosworth in Massey Hall, Toronto, died this afternoon. The parents lost their only other child, a little girl, in March last.

PRESIDENT REYNOLDS UNABLE TO ATTEND ROTARY CONVENTION

Head of Agricultural College Cancels Trip To Scotland.

GUELPH, May 11.—It will be a source of genuine regret to Rotarians generally to learn that President J. B. Reynolds of the O. A. C., will not be able to go to Scotland this month as the representative at the International Association of Rotary Club annual convention, which meets in Edinburgh on

June 12 to 17. Prof. Reynolds announced today that he had found it necessary because of official duties, to cancel the proposed trip, after he had practically completed making all arrangements to sail the latter part of this month. Beyond stating that official business at the college made it necessary for him to cancel his visit to Scotland, and deeply regretting his inability to go, Prof. Reynolds did not make any further explanation regarding the change in his plans.

MAKE PUBLIC APPEAL FOR NEEDY FAMILY

Farmer Near Houghton Center Has Wife and Nine Children.

[Special To The Advertiser.] SIMCOE, May 11.—One of the worst cases of its kind ever revealed in the county came to light in court here this afternoon before Magistrate R. E. Gunton, when Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Underhill of Houghton Centre told a pitiful story of sickness, hunger and destitution. The couple have nine children, the oldest 20 years old and the youngest a few weeks. The condition

of the family was brought to the attention of D. E. McIntosh, agent of the Children's Aid Society, and he, in turn, took it up with the magistrate. Mr. Underhill was taken sick, and then his wife was stricken. The children one by one became ill, and things came to such a pass that there was not only insufficient food to go around, but they had not enough clothing for bed clothes. In order to come to court they had to be supplied with clothing. Mrs. Underhill in court said that she had never begged in her life, but now she would be glad to have any assistance she could get. It was decided to make a public appeal to assist the family in getting a start, and the matter will be taken up not only with the township council, but throughout the district.
