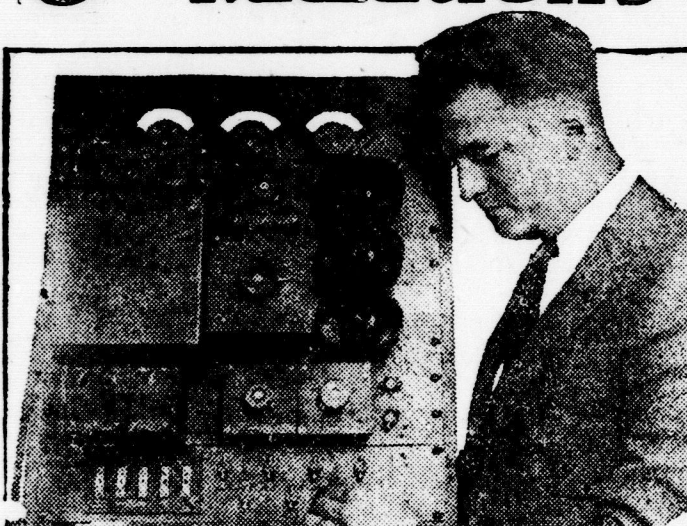

Radio Radiations



It is no longer necessary to put any more stress on talk to be broadcast by radio than is used in ordinary conversation. The new speech input amplifier, shown above, takes care of that. This apparatus amplifies the voice before it enters the transmitting apparatus. Not only is it easy to send the voice broadcast, but the transmitting operator is enabled to hear the voice directly, so that he may supervise the broadcasting.

HELP FOR SHIPS.
 Ships without radio facilities, hereafter, will get weather reports—by radio!

This will be done through the aid of those ships that can pick up the weather warnings flashed over the waters from the scattered government stations. It will be a courtesy of the sea which will mean the saving of many lives and much money in vessels and cargo.
 After picking up storm or other warnings by radio, they are to relay these by international code or other methods established for some time at sea. The warnings are flashed at regular intervals from any of about 20 high-powered radio stations throughout the world.

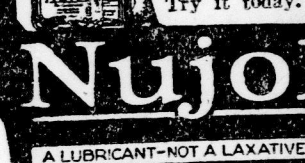

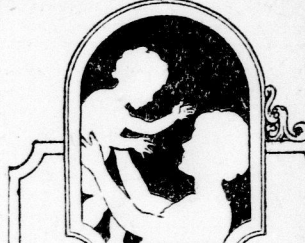

Why Not Vary Your Menus? Here's How

So many women, whose duty it is to feed a family three times a day, get tired and discouraged doing the same thing over and over! Thinking to find something new, they read recipes from a cook book or magazine.

There it is, and they attempt a new dish which takes much time and some money, and then often come the exclamations from the "family," "I would rather have your cake than this!" Do not try a difficult recipe unless quite sure that the time will be well spent, and the result acceptable to the family. Rather, use your own recipe, and change its form or garnish.

The one reliable cake recipe may be baked in muffin tins and served with a chocolate or fruit sauce.

The plain cornstarch pudding may have the whites of three eggs added to it as it comes from the fire. A sauce made from the yolks, in other words a soft custard, will quite change the pudding. Or line the mold in which the pudding is cooled with slices of canned pineapple and it is quite a new dessert.

Or, instead of serving the chopped meat in balls, make a roll of it, bake it, and serve a tomato sauce with it. Save out bread dough, if you make your own bread, and add some sugar, a little butter, and an egg, and surprise the family with some sweet rolls.

Too many cooks are afraid of experimenting and feel that they must have a recipe before them. Someone invents new dishes, why not you? A soup kettle is a wonderful thing! In it can go so many scraps, bits of raw vegetables, bones from roasts,

and the result is a stock which can be used for sauces, or soup, or a liquid in which to cook vegetables.

A soup, even though there is but little meat in it, which has vegetables and beans and macaroni or rice, is sufficient for a meal when served with bread and butter, possibly a salad, and a sweet. A few left-over vegetables, such as one boiled potato, half a cup of peas, a stalk of celery, a beet, and, of course, a bit of onion will make a small salad. And if by chance an egg was left at breakfast time, chop it and put it in the salad.

A small amount of cooked vegetable may always be used for the foundation of a cream soup.

It is not the cost originally, but the utilization of food which makes for economy.
