Victorian Order Offers Scholarships To Nurses

Institute of Public Health Receives Word of Fifteen Scholarships For Canadian Universities—Applications From This District.

Fifteen scholarships for nurses have been offered by the Dominion branch of the Victorian Order, word to this effect reaching the Institute of Public Health yesterday. A certain proportion of these scholarships will come to the Western Ontario University in connection with the public health course at that university.

The scholarship entitles a registered graduate nurse to a year's course at the university, the only proviso being that on her graduation she shall spend one year with the Victorian Order at the prevailing salary of the order at that time.

Already several applications for scholarships have come in to the Victorian Order from nurses of this district who wish to attend the Western Ontario University. Last year seven Victorian Order scholarship nurses graduated in the city.

Two F. D. Cross scholarships, are also available at this university, and the new term beginning October 3 promises to find a large registration.

Miss Margaret McDermid, director of nurses at the Institute, has just returned from Toronto, where she attended a committee meeting of the Provincial Nurses' Association, where summer courses for nurses in the province formed the chief topic of discussion. It was decided not to hold a summer course at London this year, but it is quite possible that a special short course will be held during the summer of next year at Western University.

DINNER REFORMED.

The housewife sighed as she rose from the big, cool chair on the veranda, where she had been enjoying the lovely late afternoon at the bungalow she had taken for the summer.

"Just can't bear to go in and start dinner," she murmured. "This is the most charming part of the day, and I'm all daintily dressed in my best summer dress. I'm not hungry for hot food, anyway; but you see Peter comes home on this 5:30 train and he has had a shower and changed, he is ready for a regular meal."

The friend who was visiting her hesitated a moment, and then said: "I wonder if my summer day scheme wouldn't work splendidly for you. I too, at this time of the year, have to go into a hot kitchen just as the hostess."
