FIVE CHILDREN DROWNED.

Halifax, Sept. 13.—Five children lost their lives in a drowning accident at Port Felix, Guysboro county, this afternson. They crossed a small lake in an old flat-bottomed boat left there for berry-pickers. The journey over was made in safety by twos, but on the return trip all attempted to come at once, with the result that the boat capsized, the eldest child of the party alone reaching the shore safely.
