GERMANS RETREATING ALONG WIDE FRONT

Allies Keep Pressing Forward and Reports From Front Are Good—Germans Losing Large Number of Men Guns and War Material.

(Special to the Graphic.)
LONDON, Sept. 5.—A despatch from General Haig reports British forces which crossed Canal du Nord yesterday, continued their advance and crossed Tortille River on wide front north of Moislains. British were supported by Canadians. In this operation Manacourt and Etricourt were taken and British reached outskirts of Havricourt Wood. Advance continues at all points. French War Office announces French forces yesterday crossed the Vesle River on a wide front of twenty miles and advanced beyond Chassigny, Brenelle, Vaubertin and Blansy and gained footing on northern crest of Basilleux, advance has reached point six miles from important crossing of valley of Aisne River. Enemy retreating along his whole front north of the Vesle. Late despatch reports LeFere burning.

LONDON, Sept. 4.—Information from the front to-day is that the coal mining city of Lens is still mainly in German possession. British patrols, however, are reported to be in the western portion of the town.

PARIS, Sept. 4.—French troops yesterday and last night continued to push back the Germans to the east of the Canal Du Nord and between the Ailette and the Aisne, says to-day's war office statement.

Prisoners to the number of 1,500 were taken.

LIEUT.-COL. McKENZIE KILLED IN ACTION

Another Campbellton Man Gives His Life For Country—Had Rapid Rise to Commander of 26th—Death Will be Keenly Felt.

The sad news was received here at noon to-day by telephone that Lieut.-Col. A. E. G. McKenzie D. S. O. had been killed in action on August 28th.

Campbellton has in this great war lost many of her best sons, but none will be more sincerely mourned than Lieut.-Col. McKenzie. He was perhaps the most popular Campbellton boy to offer for active service. As Captain he assisted in the formation of the 26th Battalion which on the field of battle has earned the title of "The Fighting 26th." He was promoted to adjutant and then to Major. When Lieut.-Col. McAvity had to give up command he was given charge of the Battalion and latter promoted to Lieut.-Col. For a time he was acting Brigadier of the division. Always a soldier, he took his work seriously and his loss will be keenly felt in his battalion, where he was not only a commander but a leader.

His wife, formerly Miss Troy of Newcastle, father, former Collector of Customs of the Port of Campbellton, foster mother, and brothers and sisters have the sympathy of the entire community in their sad bereavement. Of the family every boy of military age, (four) joined the colors and are now or have been overseas.

Restigouche county and the province have lost one of its promising young men, one who had the education and ability to fill any position.

SCHOOLS FILLED TO OVERFLOWING

Nearly Three Hundred Permits
Issued—Large Teaching Staff.

The town schools reopened Tuesday morning after the summer vacation with a record attendance, the accommodation being taxed to the utmost capacity. A much larger number of permits were issued this year than usually owing to the management of the Convent School some four or five weeks ago having decided to close its doors. In this school there were some 186 pupils, the large majority of whom, provision had to be made for in the town schools. The Board of School Trustees have therefore during the past month been quite busy in providing the hurried accommodation. Three extra class rooms have been provided, all of which are in the Campbellton Grammar School building. The rooms formerly used by the Manual Training Department and the Natural Science Department have been converted into

class rooms and an additional one erected in the Assembly Hall. Three additional teachers have been engaged, so that today the teaching staff numbers twenty, and this will be increased within the next few days by the employment of a French teacher.

The enrollment of scholars now in the Campbellton schools is something over 1000. The exact number will not be obtainable for a few days yet. Last year there was an enrollment of 765, divided as follows:—Grammar School 561, Roseberry Street School 194.

In the Grammar School building Mr. Hugh C. Titus of Marysville, will be in charge, he having been engaged as principal.

In the Roseberry Street School, the former principal, Miss Mary A. Gillin, B. A., of Woodstock, will be in charge. Following are the teachers' names with places of residence and class license, also the Grades they are in charge of:—
