SUPPORTS CADET AND SCOUT MOVES

Dean Tucker Says Militarism Is Not Fostered

PARADE TO ST. PAUL'S

Some 800 City Cadets Join March To Cathedral

Fear of the incultation of a spirit of militarism in Canada through the cadet, boy scout and girl guide movements was a groundless one, according to Dean Tucker, of St. Paul's Cathedral, addressing a capacity congregation on Sunday morning on the occasion of the church parade of the public school cadets of the city.

The cadets, some 800 strong, assembled at the Federal Square shortly after 10.30 o'clock and there formed into parade order. The march to the church was viewed by large crowds of citizens and many comments of a highly complimentary nature were heard on the smart appearance of the khaki-clad boys. The cadet troops were accompanied by the band of the Royal Canadian Regiment, the scarlet uniforms of the regulars adding a touch of brilliancy to the scene. The uniforms of the cadets, the hand was under the leadership of L. K. Harrison, L. R. A. M. In the cathedral the cadets occupied the central section of the building.

At the close of the service the parade was reformed on the grounds outside the church and the boys marched back to the Federal Square where the various school corps broke off and proceeded to their respective districts. Looking down upon the bright faces of the uniformed boys, Dean Tucker declared that if one wish could be granted him it would be that he could be put back to the age of 15 to take his place among the boys to prepare themselves for the great era by training themselves in hand and mind that they might be more than mere rotters in the great game of life. He recalled the fact that in the last thing in the world that he needed, military men are not bloodthirsty. They of all people realize what war means.

"It is good for a man to bear his share in his youth," was the appropriate text selected by the dean for his sermon, which was addressed partly to the boys themselves in words of kindly advice and partly to the older members of the assembly.

The speaker pointed out that the boys were beginning life in an era which was wonderful in its outlook. Some of those who were born in the year 2000 and in the next 15 years there would be seen such wonders in Canada and the world as a whole that would pass all understanding. He advised the boys to prepare themselves for the great era by training themselves in hand and mind that they might be more than mere rotters in the great game of life. He recalled the fact that in the last thing in the world that he needed, military men are not bloodthirsty. They of all people realize what war means.

ENVIALE POSITION The speaker pointed out the enviable position which Canada occupied in its removal from fear of military aggression. He declared that happiness came from within in making oneself adequate for the work which one was called upon to do.

Touching on some of the good points of the cadet and scout movements, the dean pointed to its value from the aspect of physical training. He recalled the fact that in the Great War half the men examined for service were unfit. Surely there was need to remedy such a condition which spelled inefficiency in the whole nation. It was his hope that also a tendency to improve the manners of the youth of the day, which according to standards of other years were becoming rather lax. In this connection a debt was owing all these movements. With so much in their favor they should be upheld in every way as an additional to the efficiency of the country.

Speaking directly to the cadets the dean pointed out that they were entering upon life in a wonderful era. There was, however, a great tendency in the modern idea of life to place riches to the fore as the goal of happiness. He pointed to the erroneousness of this and declared that happiness came from within in making oneself adequate for the work which one was called upon to do.

MANY SUFFER IN GOLD STAMPEDE

No Supplies Or Equipment In North B. C. Camp

EXPECT RELIEF SOON Wait For Pack Train To Complete 102-Mile Trip

SEATTLE, Wash., May 30.—(Associated Press Dispatch).—Stampedeers to the new gold diggings in the Cassiar country of Northern British Columbia are suffering under severe privations, stated a dispatch from F. J. Cotter, a thorough poet and miner, published by the Post Intelligencer. The dispatch, which came from Telegraph Creek, B. C., said: "No supplies or equipment are on

the ground, but it is believed the condition will be relieved when a pack train completes the 102-mile trip from here. The Hudson's Bay Company will send a five-ton tractor loaded with supplies to Dease Lake this week. "There is much snow still in the hills, and the streams are running up the banks."

LONDON TOWNSHIP MAN SUCCUMBS SUDDENLY

Stricken with a sudden attack of heart trouble while completing the day's work on his farm, lot 19, concession 11, London Township, on Saturday night, Augustus Kennedy, aged 52 years, died shortly after medical assistance arrived. He had been in his usual health when he went out to complete the night's work, the illness coming on suddenly. Surviving him is his wife, Mr. Kennedy was one of the best-known farmers in that locality. He had resided there practically all his life and was well known. The funeral will be held from the family residence to-morrow afternoon, Rev. Mr. Shore, of Ilderton Anglican Church, officiating. Interment will be made in Woodland Cemetery, London.

MAY BE COMPELLED TO USE A SMALLER BOAT

Company Operating City of St. Ignace Complains of Slowness of Dredging At Port Stanley

In view of present conditions of the Port Stanley harbor, which makes it difficult for a boat of larger size to dock, the City of St. Ignace, running between Port and Cleveland, may be withdrawn from the service. This announcement has been made by officials of the Western Reserve Steamship Company, of Cleveland, owners of the steamer, who declare that the slowness of the dredging operations is causing a blockade. It is declared by the officials that delay in the dredging operations will mean the replacement of the City of St. Ignace by a smaller boat or the elimination of the service to Cleveland altogether. Representatives of the company state that the first trips of the larger craft were entirely satisfactory to the firm, both from the standpoint of the number of passengers carried and the time necessary to make the trip. It is pointed out, however, that unless the dredging operations are completed soon a change will be necessary in the size of steamer used or the service canceled.
