The past year has been quite free of The past year has been quite free of the severer contagious diseases. Typhoid fever has appeared in a few localities, yet nowhere epidemic.

Pneumonia continues to be our most prevalent and fatal acute disease, yet as far as I have been able to ascertain from death statistics, the number of fatal cases from this disease has not been as large in 1904 as the previous year.

REPAIR ROOMS.

The opening of the Tuberculosis Sanitarium at Kentville by the Nova Scotia Government we trust may work a change for the better in our statistics of this disease.

As the Sanitarium will only accommedate a limited number of patients.
