ON THE RECOMMENDATION

OF THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE, HIS EXCELLENCY THE

GOVERNOR GENERAL HAS

BEEN PLEASED TO ORDER

AND IT IS HEREBY ORDERED

THAT THE ORDER IN COUN-

CIL DATED 6TH JULY, 1877,

requiring all Justices of the Peace and other

persons in the North-west territories

and District of Keewatin, who have

collected or may collect any fines or pen-

alties under the Criminal Laws of Canada,

in respect of which no provision to

the contrary exists, to pay the amounts to

either the Lieutenant-Governors of the

North-west Territories or Keewatin, or

to the Commissioner of the North-west

Mounted Police, be and the same is hereby re-

pealed, and that in place thereof, all Justices

of the Peace and other persons in the

North-west Territories who have collect-

ed or may collect any fines or penalties,

under the Criminal Laws of Canada: in re-

spect of which no provision to the con-

trary exists, be required to pay, every

quarter, the amounts so collected to the

Lieutenant-Governor of the North-west

Territories, and similarly that all Justices

of the Peace and other persons in this Dis-

trict of Keewatin so collecting fines or pen-

alties shall pay the same every quarter

to the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba

in his capacity as Lieutenant-Governor of

Keewatin, and that where possible, the

parties collecting any money as aforesaid

shall deposit the same to the credit of the

THE RANCHO COUNTRY.

The Lease Question.

(No. 2.)

From our Special Correspondent.

A considerable time has elapsed since the

date of my last letter, which has been caused

principally by my absence from town on a

second visit to Fort McLeod on professional

business, and I now take the first oppor-

tunity of redeeming my promise of giving

you my views on the somewhat vexatious

question of the Rancho Leases. Whatever

difference of opinion may exist, as to the

propriety of the policy of the Govern-

ment in leasing large tracts of land en-

tirely for grazing purposes, to the practical

exclusion of bona fide settlers from such

lands, there can be no question that the

Leaseholders, who have invested large sums

of money on the faith of the privileges con-

ferred by those leases, are entitled to have their

rights protected by the Government and re-

spected by outsiders. But it is manifest that

much hardship may, and in fact has already

occurred to genuine bona fide settlers, who

may innocently and ignorantly go upon

lands already leased for grazing purposes,

with the intention of settling, and expending

their money on improvements, not knowing

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
