#### AIRPORT PARKING RATES

Question No. 1,627—Mr. Horner (Acadia):

1. What is the daily rate for parking at airports in Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Edmonton?

2. Who sets the charge and is the charge the same at each airport?

3. If charges at various airports are variated, what is the reason for this?

Hon. J. W. Pickersgill (Minister of Transport): 1. (a) Daily rates for manned parking facilities: Ottawa, Winnipeg and Edmonton international airports (surface parking): 10 cents for the first half hour or portion thereof; or portion thereof; 25 cents for each additional four hours or portion thereof; \$1.50, daily maximum rate.

Note: At the Edmonton international airport a weekly rate of \$7 was recently introduced.

Montreal international airport (surface parking): 25 cents for the first two hours or portion thereof; 25 cents for each additional four hours or portion thereof; \$1.50, daily maximum rate.

Toronto international airport (structure parking): 25 cents for the first two hours or portion thereof; 15 cents for the second two hours or portion thereof; 25 cents for the third two hours or portion thereof; 25 cents for each additional three hours or portion thereof; \$2, daily maximum rate.

(b) Metered parking rates: Ottawa, Winnipeg, Edmonton international airports: 10 cents for one half hour with a maximum metered parking of one hour.

Montreal and Toronto international airports; 25 cents for one half hour with a maximum metered parking of one hour.

2 and 3. The charge is set by the concessionaire, subject to the approval of the department, and may vary from airport to airport according to local conditions and local requirements.

# Question No. 1,640-Mr. Stenson:

Has the Department of Forestry any way of combatting Dutch elm disease which is killing many elm trees in Ontario and Quebec, and, if so,
